## Executive Summary

This Demographics Report, which was prepared for the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD), presents a synthesis of demographic information describing members and families in the military community in fiscal year 2017.<sup>1</sup> Active Duty Service branches include DoD's Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force; and the Reserve components include DoD's Army National Guard, Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve, and DHS's Coast Guard Reserve.

### Overview of Military Personnel

The total number of military personnel is almost 3.5 million strong, including DoD Active Duty military personnel (1,294,520); DHS's Active Duty Coast Guard members (40,600); DoD Ready Reserve and DHS Coast Guard Reserve members (1,057,082); members of the Retired Reserve (208,608) and Standby Reserve (9,682); and DoD Appropriated and Non-Appropriated Funds civilian personnel (868,648). DoD's Active Duty and DHS's Coast Guard Active Duty members comprise the largest portion of the military force (38.4%), followed by Ready Reserve members (30.4%) and DoD civilian personnel (25.0%).

### Active Duty Member Highlights

**Service Branches.** The Army has the largest number of Active Duty members (472,047) followed by the Navy (319,492), the Air Force (318,580), and the Marine Corps (184,401). At a total of 1,294,520 DoD Active Duty members, the military force of 2017 is 8.7 percent smaller than it was in 2010, when there were 1,417,370 Active Duty members. From 2010 to 2017, the Army (-16.0%), Marine Corps (-9.0%), Air Force (-3.4%), and Navy (-1.1%) all experienced a decrease in the number of members.

**Ratio of Ranks.** The DoD Active Duty force is composed of 82.3 percent enlisted personnel (1,065,234) and 17.7 percent officers (229,286). Overall, the Active Duty force has 4.6 enlisted personnel for every one officer. In comparison, the Army has one officer for every 4.1 enlisted personnel, the Air Force has one officer for every 4.2 enlisted personnel, the Navy has one officer for every 4.9 enlisted personnel, and the Marine Corps has one officer for every 7.7 enlisted personnel.

**Gender.** Women, who number 210,336, comprise 16.2 percent of the DoD Active Duty force, while 1,084,184 men comprise 83.8 percent of the DoD Active Duty force. Compared to 2010, both the percentage of Active Duty enlisted members and the percentage of Active Duty officers who are women has increased (from 14.1% and 15.7%, respectively, in 2010 to 15.9% and 17.7%, respectively, in 2017). Overall, the number and ratio of female enlisted members (169,850) to female officers (12,921) is 4.2 female enlisted members for every one female officer, while the number and ratio of male enlisted members (895,384) to male officers (188,800) is 4.7 male enlisted members for every one male officer.

**Race/Ethnicity.** Less than one-third (31.3%) or 404,920 of Active Duty members identify themselves as a racial minority (i.e., Black or African American, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, Multi-racial, or Other/Unknown). The percentage of Active Duty members who identify themselves as a racial minority increased each year from 2010 to 2016 (from 31.4% of enlisted members and 22.7% of officers in 2010, to 33.2% of enlisted members and 23.0% of officers in 2016). From 2016 to 2017, the percentage of enlisted members who identify themselves as a racial minority decreased (from 33.2% to 33.0%) while the percentage of officers increased (from 23.0% to 23.3%). The overall ratio of racial minority enlisted personnel (351,445) to racial minority officers (53,475) is 6.6 racial minority enlisted personnel for every one racial minority officer. To conform to the latest Office of

Management and Budget (OMB) directives, Hispanic is not considered a minority race designation and only Active Duty members' race was used to determine racial minority status. Regarding ethnicity, 15.5 percent of Active Duty members identify themselves as being of Hispanic or Latino ethnicity.

**Geographic Location.** While the Active Duty population is located throughout the world, the three primary areas in which Active Duty members are assigned are the United States and its territories (87.5%), East Asia (5.4%), and Europe (5.1%). The ten states with the highest Active Duty military populations are California (127,720), Texas (116,810), North Carolina (97,025), Virginia (88,045), Georgia (63,448), Florida (53,559), Washington (45,793), South Carolina (37,304), Hawaii (35,796), and Colorado (35,192). Active Duty members in these ten states comprise 67.4 percent of the personnel stationed in the United States.

**Age.** Over half (51.7%) of Active Duty enlisted personnel are 25 years of age or younger, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (20.8%), followed by 31 to 35 years (13.8%), 36 to 40 years (8.8%), and those 41 years or older (4.8%). Almost one-quarter (24.3%) of Active Duty officers are 41 years of age or older, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (22.7%), followed by 31 to 35 years (21.2%), 36 to 40 years (17.7%), and those 25 years or younger (14.2%). Overall, the average age of the Active Duty force is 28.3 years. The average age for Active Duty enlisted personnel is 27.0 years, and the average age for Active Duty officers is 34.5 years.

**Education Level.** Most enlisted members (80.6%) have a high school diploma and/or some college experience, while fewer have an Associate's degree (10.5%) or a Bachelor's degree or higher (8.3%). The majority (84.8%) of officers have a Bachelor's or higher degree. Compared to 2010, the percentage of total Active Duty members who have a Bachelor's and/or an advanced degree increased for enlisted personnel (from 4.8% in 2010 to 8.3% in 2017) and officers (from 82.7% in 2010, to 84.8% in 2017).

**Marital Status.** Just over half (52.6%) of Active Duty military members are married, which is lower than the percentage that were married in 2010 (56.4%). In 2017, almost half (49.2%) of enlisted members and a majority (68.4%) of officers report themselves as married. Over half (54.0%) of Active Duty males and nearly half (45.3%) of Active Duty females are married. In addition, 6.6 percent of DoD's Active Duty members are in dual-military marriages.<sup>2</sup> During the 2016 fiscal year, 3.5 percent of enlisted personnel and 1.7 percent of officers are estimated to have divorced.

## Reserve and Guard (Selected Reserve) Member Highlights

**Reserve Components.** The Ready Reserve comprises the Selected Reserve, the Individual Ready Reserve, and the Inactive National Guard. Because Selected Reserve members train throughout the year and participate annually in Active Duty training exercises, this report primarily focuses on the Selected Reserve, unless otherwise specified. The Selected Reserve Force consists of 815,116 members in seven components. The Army National Guard (343,603) and Army Reserve (194,318) have the largest number of Selected Reserve members, followed by the Air National Guard (105,670), the Air Force Reserve (68,798), the Navy Reserve (57,824), the Marine Corps Reserve (38,682), and the DHS's Coast Guard Reserve (6,221). Similar to the Active Duty force, the overall number of members in the Selected Reserve is lower in 2017 compared to 2010. The Selected Reserve force is 4.9 percent smaller than it was in 2010 (when there were 857,261 Selected Reserve members).

**Ratio of Ranks.** The Selected Reserve is composed of 83.8 percent enlisted personnel (683,063) and 16.2 percent officers (132,053). Overall, there are 5.2 enlisted personnel for every one officer in the Selected Reserve. This ratio varies across the Selected Reserve, with the Navy Reserve having 3.1 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Air Force Reserve having 4.0 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Army Reserve having 4.2 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Coast Guard Reserve having 4.9 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Air National Guard having 5.9 enlisted personnel for every one officer, the Army National Guard having 6.5 enlisted personnel for every one officer, and the Marine Corps Reserve having 7.8 enlisted personnel for every one officer.

**Gender.** Women, who number 159,749, comprise 19.6 percent of the Selected Reserve force, while 655,367 men comprise 80.4 percent of the Selected Reserve force. The percentage of women in the Selected Reserve has increased since 2010 (from 17.8% of enlisted members and 18.2% of officers in 2010, to 19.6% of enlisted members and 19.4% of officers in 2017). Overall, the ratio of female enlisted members (134,181) to female officers (25,568) is 5.2 female enlisted members for every one female officer, and the ratio of male enlisted members (548,882) to male officers (106,485) is also 5.2 male enlisted members for every one male officer.

**Race/Ethnicity.** Approximately one-quarter (26.1% or 213,024) of the Selected Reserve members identify themselves as a racial minority (i.e., Black or African American, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, Multi-racial, or Other/Unknown). The Selected Reserve is composed of 186,186 racial minority enlisted personnel and 26,838 racial minority officers, with 6.9 racial minority enlisted personnel for every one racial minority officer. The overall racial minority representation in the Selected Reserve has increased in the past five years for both enlisted personnel (from 24.9% in 2010 to 27.3% in 2017) and for officers (from 18.9% in 2010 to 20.3% in 2017). To conform to the latest Office of Management and Budget (OMB) directives, Hispanic is not considered a minority race designation and only Active Duty members' race was used to determine racial minority status. Regarding ethnicity, 11.5 percent of Selected Reserve members identify themselves as being of Hispanic or Latino ethnicity.

**Geographic Location.** The majority (98.9% or 806,045) of the Selected Reserve is located throughout the United States and its territories. The ten states with the highest Selected Reserve population are California (57,031), Texas (54,628), Florida (36,772), Pennsylvania (31,112), New York (29,271), Ohio (28,267), Georgia (27,184), Virginia (26,747), Illinois (24,516), and North Carolina (22,009). These ten states comprise 42.7 percent of the total Selected Reserve population in the United States.

**Age.** More than one-third (37.7%) of Selected Reserve enlisted members are 25 years of age or younger, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (21.1%), followed by 31 to 35 years (15.5%), 41 years or older (15.3%), and those 36 to 40 years (10.4%). Slightly less than half (42.6%) of Selected Reserve officers are 41 years of age or older, with the next largest age group being 36 to 40 years (20.0%), followed by 31 to 35 years (19.3%), 26 to 30 years (12.7%), and those 25 years or younger (5.5%). Overall, the average age of the Selected Reserve is 31.8 years. The average age for Selected Reserve enlisted personnel is 30.4 years, and the average age for Selected Reserve officers is 39.2 years.

**Education Level.** Most enlisted members (76.7%) have a high school diploma and/or some college experience or an Associate's degree (8.3%), and 11.7 percent of enlisted members have a Bachelor's degree or higher. The majority (87.8%) of Selected Reserve officers have a Bachelor's degree or higher. Since 2010, the percentage of Selected Reserve members who have a Bachelor's and/or advanced degree has increased for both enlisted personnel (from 8.0% in 2010 to 11.7% in 2017) and officers (from 84.5% in 2010 to 87.8% in 2017).

**Marital Status.** Just under half (44.4%) of Selected Reserve members are married, compared to 48.2 percent who were married in 2010. In 2017, 39.7 percent of Selected Reserve enlisted personnel and 68.7 percent of Selected Reserve officers report themselves as married. About one-half (46.7%) of Selected Reserve males and one-third (35.0%) of Selected Reserve females are married. In addition, 2.7 percent of the Selected Reserve report that they are in a dual-military marriage. During the 2017 fiscal year, 2.6 percent of Selected Reserve enlisted personnel and 1.9 percent of Selected Reserve officers are estimated to have divorced.

## Overview of Military Families

Across the Active Duty and Selected Reserve population, there are 2,103,415 military personnel and 2,667,909 family members, including spouses, children, and adult dependents. Of the military personnel, 44.6 percent are single with no children, 33.6 percent are married with children, 15.8 percent are married without children, and 6.0 percent are single with children. About half (49.4%) of military personnel are married. Of the 977,954 military spouses, nearly one-quarter (23.2%) of spouses are 26 to 30 years, while 22.0 percent are 31 to 35 years, 19.7 percent are 41 years or older, 19.1 percent are 25 years or younger, and 15.9 percent are 36 to 40 years. Of the 1,678,778 total military children in 2017, the largest percentage are between birth and 5 years of age (37.8%), followed by 6 to 11 years of age (31.9%), and 12 to 18 years of age (23.6%). Fewer children are between 19 and 22 years of age (6.6%); however, children ages 21 to 22 must be enrolled as full-time students in order to qualify as dependents.

## Active Duty Family Highlights

There are fewer DoD Active Duty members (1,294,520) than their associated family members (1,623,305). More than one-third of the members (34.3%) of the Active Duty force are married with children and 4.0 percent are single parents. The largest group of children is between birth and 5 years (422,556 or 42.2%). The next largest groups are between the ages of 6 and 11 years (321,972 or 32.1%), between 12 and 18 years of age (215,772 or 21.5%), and between 19 and 22 years of age (41,889 or 4.2%). There are 8,988 adult dependents 23 years and older among the families of Active Duty members.

## Reserve and Guard (Selected Reserve) Family Highlights

There are fewer DoD and DHS Selected Reserve members (815,116) than their associated family members (1,054,783). Of the 815,116 Selected Reserve members, 32.4 percent are married with children and 9.1 percent are single parents. The largest group of children is between the ages of 6 and 11 years (216,455 or 31.7%), followed by children between birth and 5 years (213,604 or 31.3%), between 12 and 18 years (182,730 or 26.8%), and between the ages of 19 and 22 years (70,136 or 10.3%). In addition, there are 1,605 adult dependents 23 years and older claimed as dependents by Selected Reserve members.

The data contained in this publication were derived from a variety of sources and, in general, only data that are available on a consistent basis for all Services are presented. The majority of data are managed by the Defense Manpower Data Center, particularly the Active Duty Military Personnel Master File, the Active Duty Military Family File, the Reserve Components Common Personnel Data System, and the Reserve Components Family File.

All exhibits included in this report contain source citations, and the Data Sources and References section of this document provides a reference for all data sources. Readers needing additional information are encouraged to directly access the listed sources.

## Guidelines for Interpreting Data

Guiding principles for interpreting data include:

- Numbers for population groups (e.g., Active Duty, enlisted members) may vary across exhibits as a result of different data sources, missing data, and/or rounding.
- Percentages may not total to 100 due to rounding or missing data.
- Warrant officers are included with officers unless otherwise noted.

In the Active Duty sections of this report, data are presented for the four DoD Service branches (Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force). Some information about the DHS's Active Duty Coast Guard is

presented in the Total Military Force section of this report. In the Reserve and Guard Members section, the label “Total DoD” is used to reflect the six Reserve components under DoD (Army National Guard, Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Air National Guard, and Air Force Reserve), while “Total Selected Reserve” includes DHS’s Coast Guard Reserve data in addition to data from the DoD Reserve components.

The data pertaining to Reserve and Guard members depict the Selected Reserve and the National Guard and do not include any other Ready Reserve forces (i.e., Individual Ready Reserve and Inactive National Guard) unless otherwise specified. The introduction to Section 3 describes the composition of the Reserve forces of the United States and explains why most data displays are limited to Selected Reserve personnel.

All data pertaining to Active Duty and Selected Reserve family members (i.e., spouses, children, and adult dependents) are extracted from the Defense Enrollment and Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). Therefore, the data are dependent on the military members reporting the necessary information.

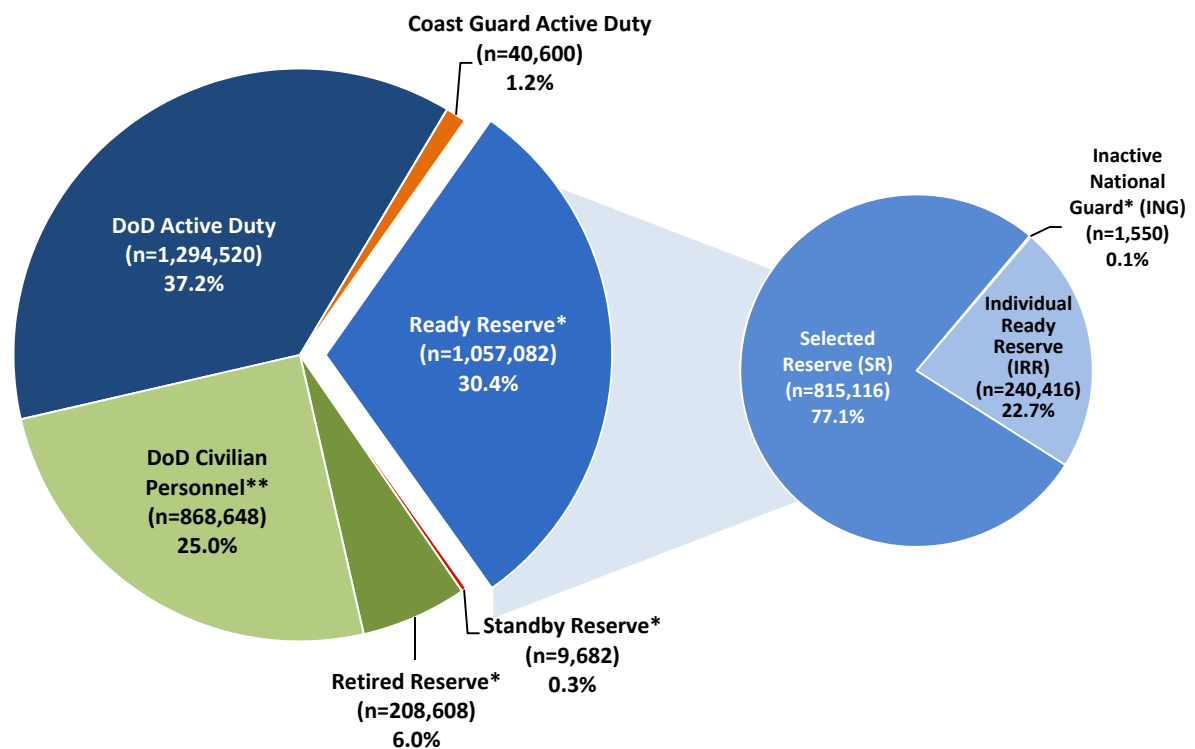


# Total Military Force

## 1.01 ■ Military Personnel and DoD Civilians (N=3,479,140)

This pie chart presents the total number of Active Duty and Reserve and Guard members from all branches of the DoD and the DHS Coast Guard, as well as the civilian personnel who support the DoD. Overall, the total military force and civilian personnel comprises 3,479,140 people. DoD's Active Duty members make up 37.2 percent of the total military force. Data for all DoD Active Duty members are presented in Section 2.

All Reserve and Guard manpower is assigned to one of three Reserve Component categories: the Ready Reserve, the Standby Reserve, or the Retired Reserve. The Ready Reserve makes up 30.4 percent of the total military force. The Ready Reserve comprises the Selected Reserve, the Individual Ready Reserve, and the Inactive National Guard. Because Selected Reserve members train throughout the year and participate annually in Active Duty training exercises, they are the primary focus of the Reserve sections of this report. DHS's Coast Guard Reserve members are frequently activated by the U.S. Navy; therefore, their data are included with Selected Reserve data in this report. Data for all Selected Reserve members are presented in Section 3.

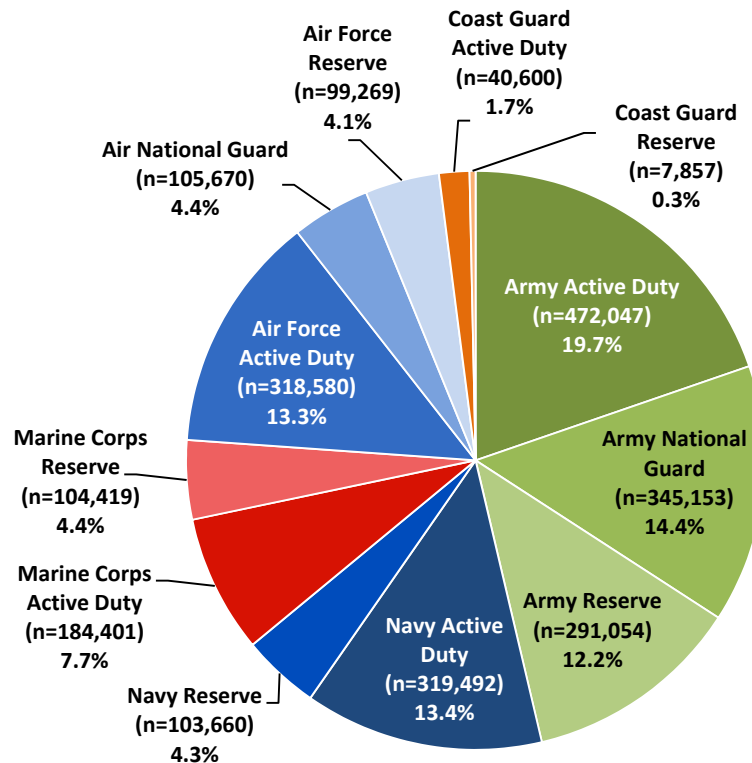

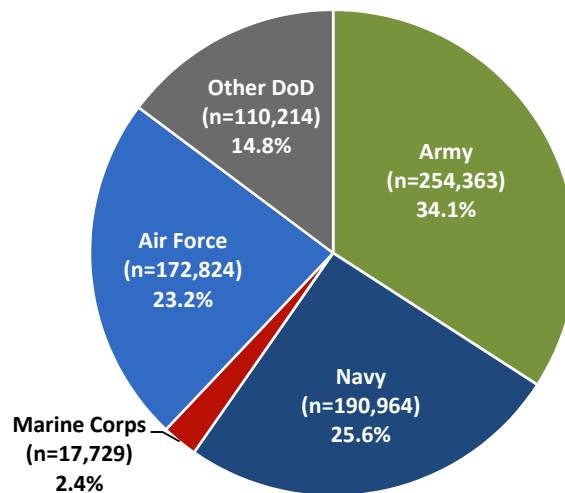

## DoD Civilian Personnel

DoD civilians are divided into two primary categories. Appropriated Funds (APF) civilian employees are funded by congressional appropriations. Non-Appropriated Funds (NAF) civilian employees are not funded by congressional appropriations, but are funded by revenue-generating activities.

### 1.03 ■ DoD Appropriated Funds (APF) Civilians (N=745,933)

There are 745,933 APF civilian personnel who constitute 21.4 percent of the total DoD workforce. Of all the DoD APF civilians, the largest percentage are employed by the Army (34.1%), followed by the Navy (25.6%), Air Force (23.2%), and other areas of the DoD (14.8%). The Marine Corps (2.4%) employs the smallest percentage of APF civilians.

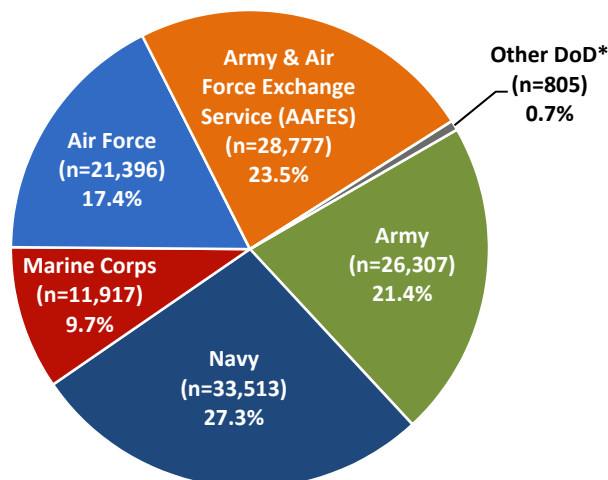

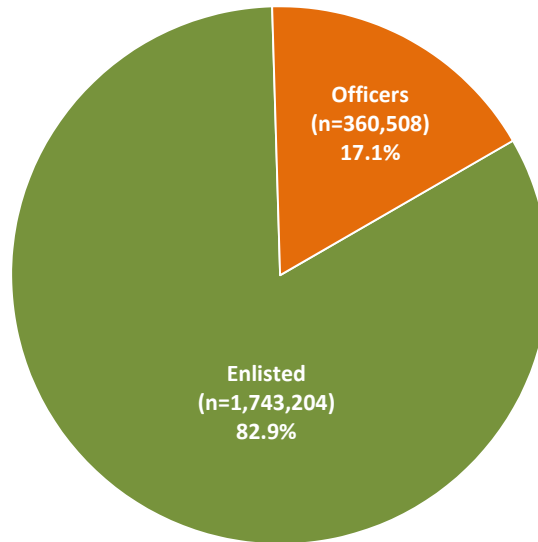

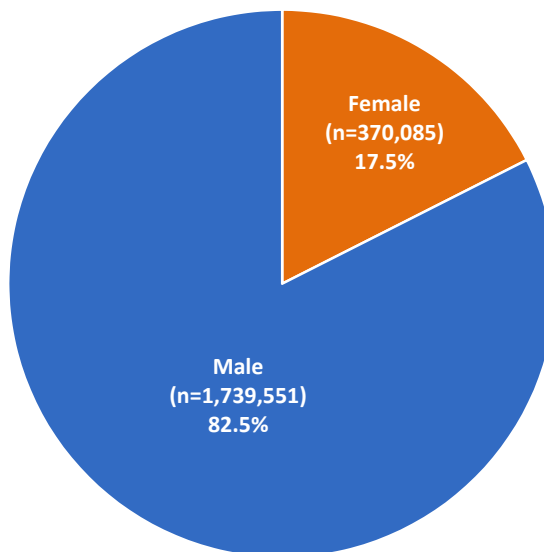

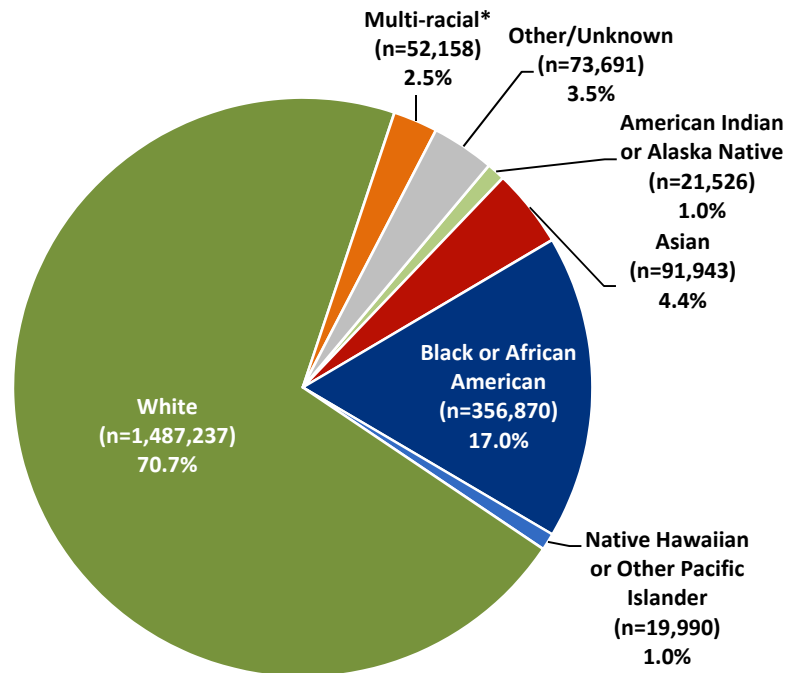

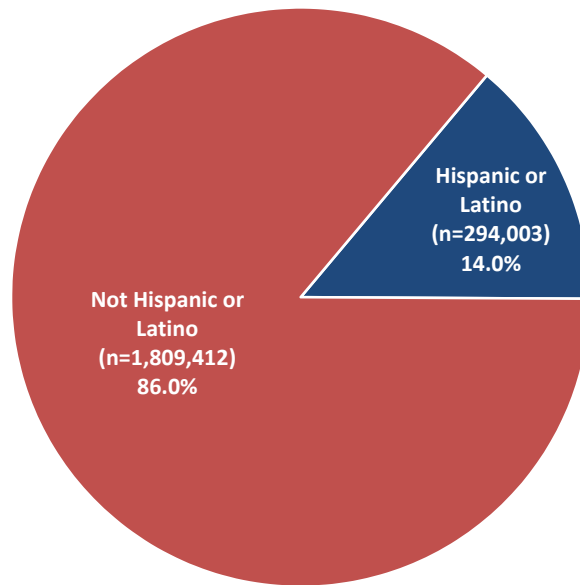

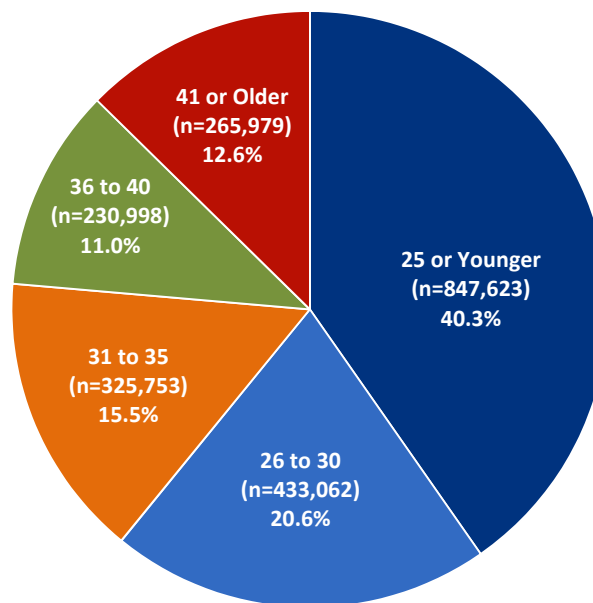

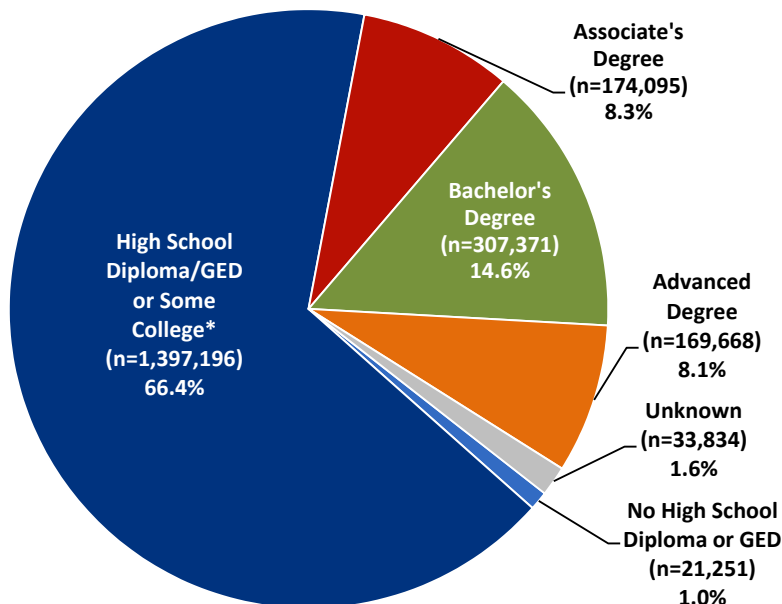

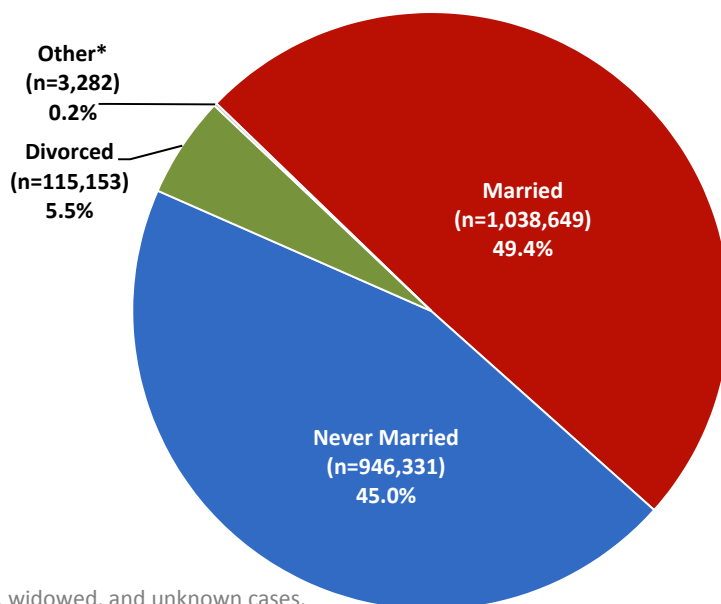

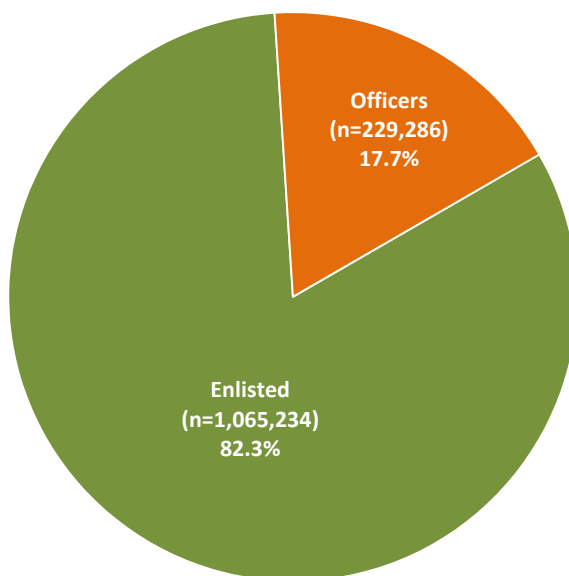

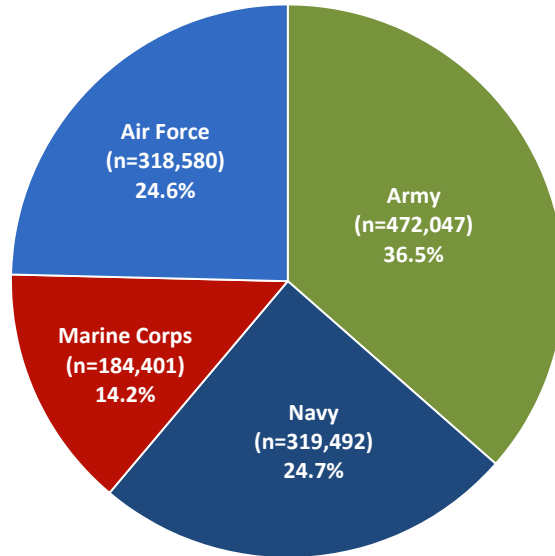

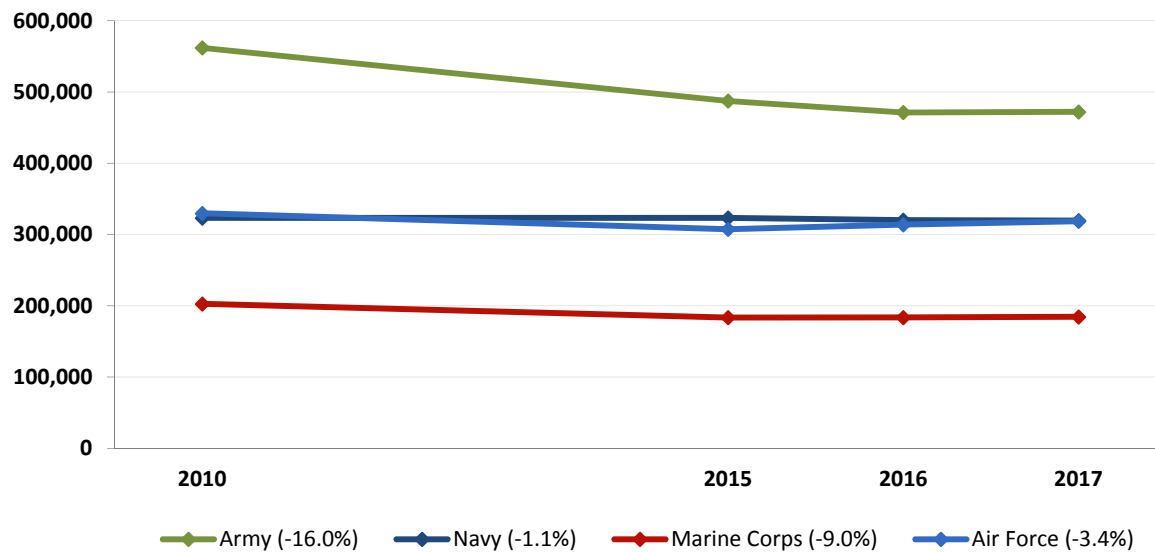

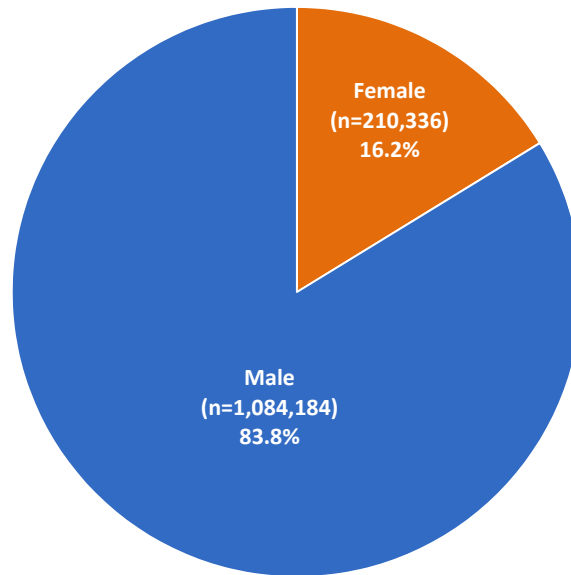

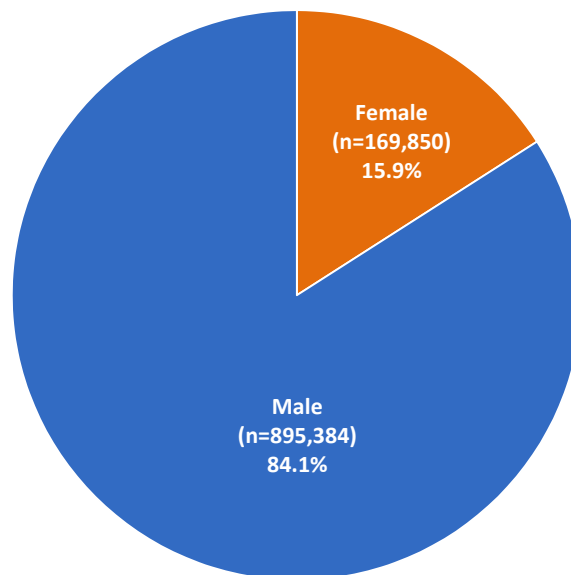

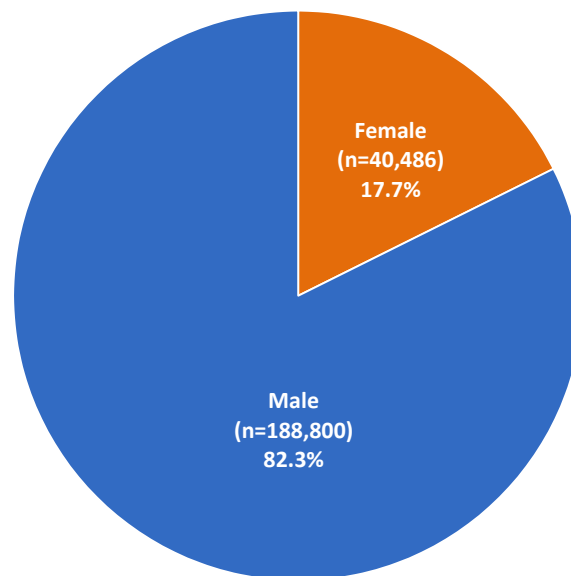

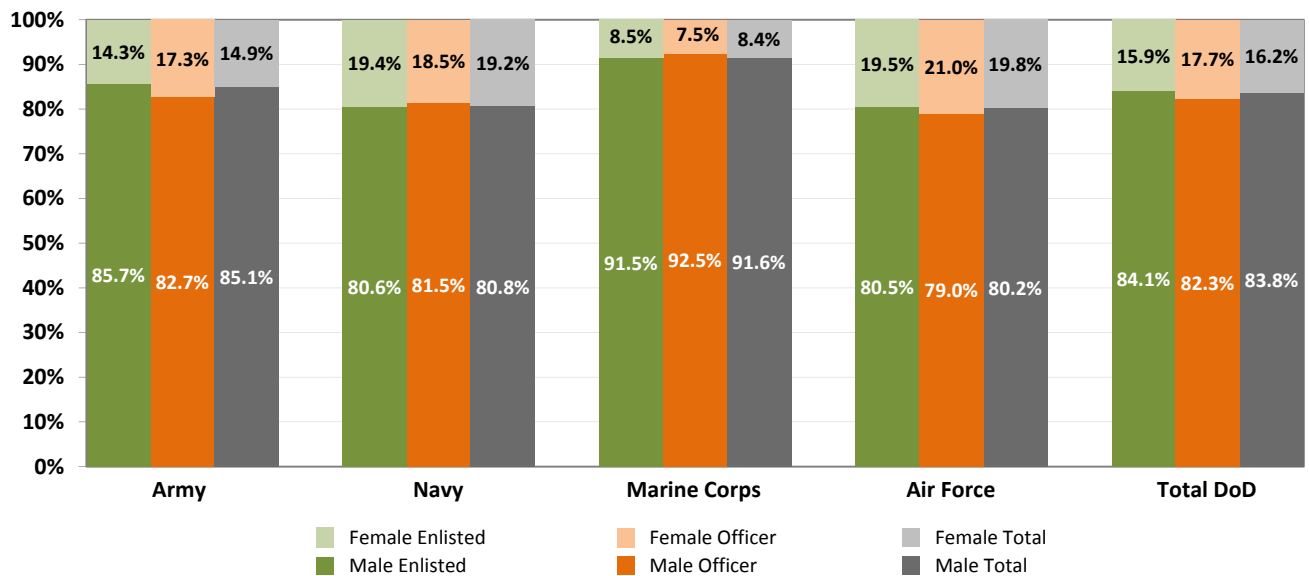

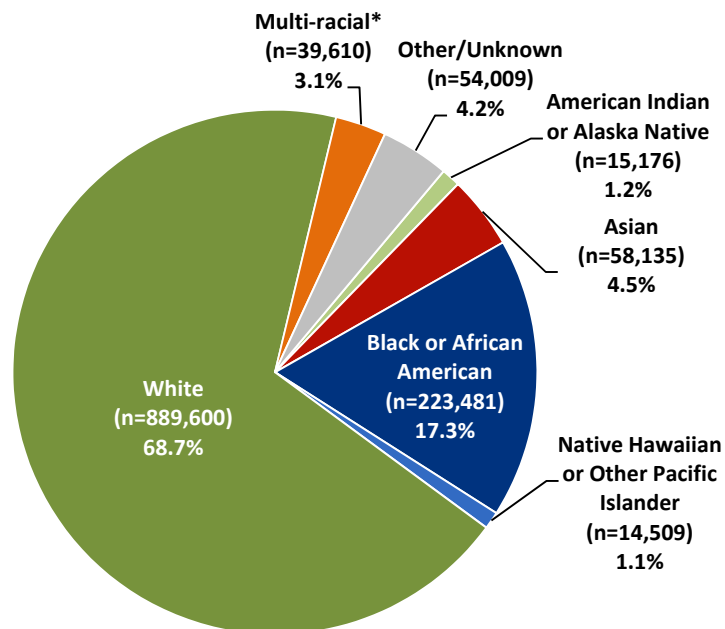

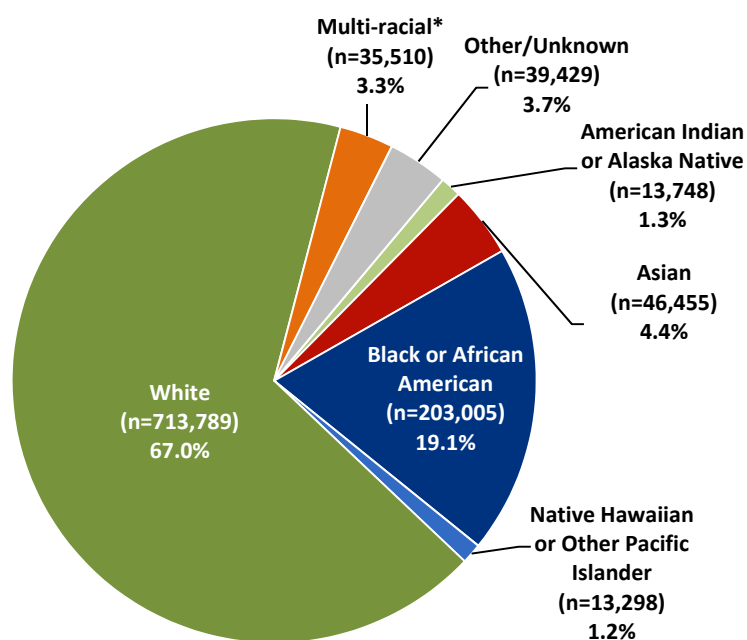

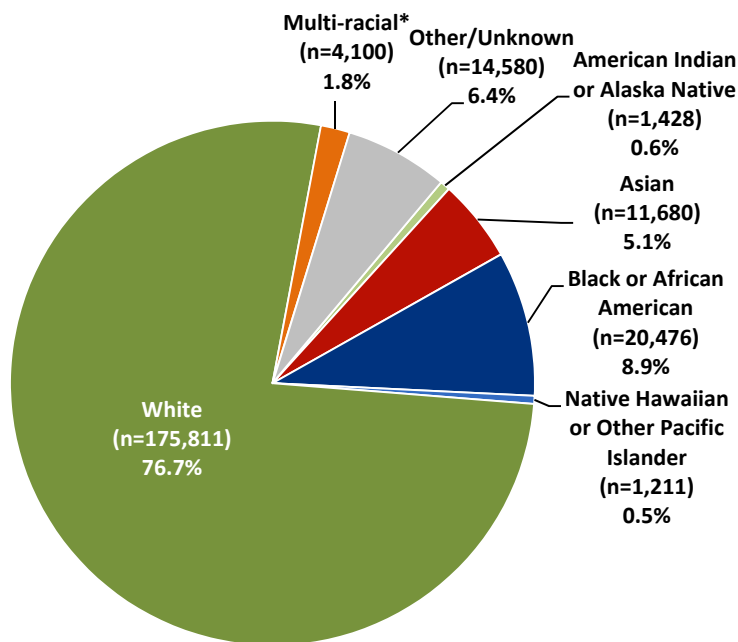

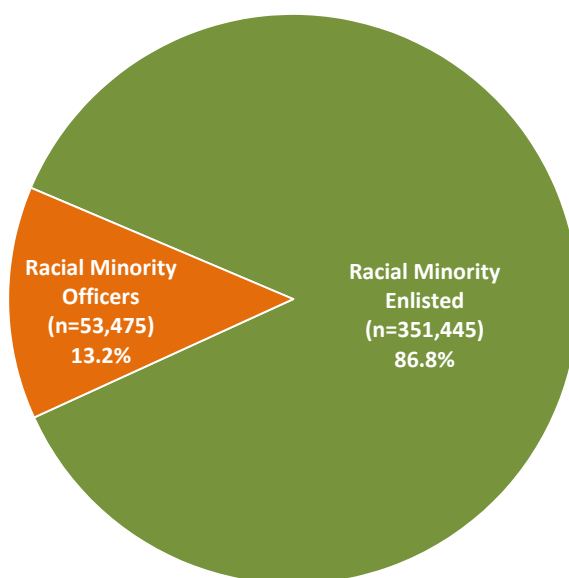

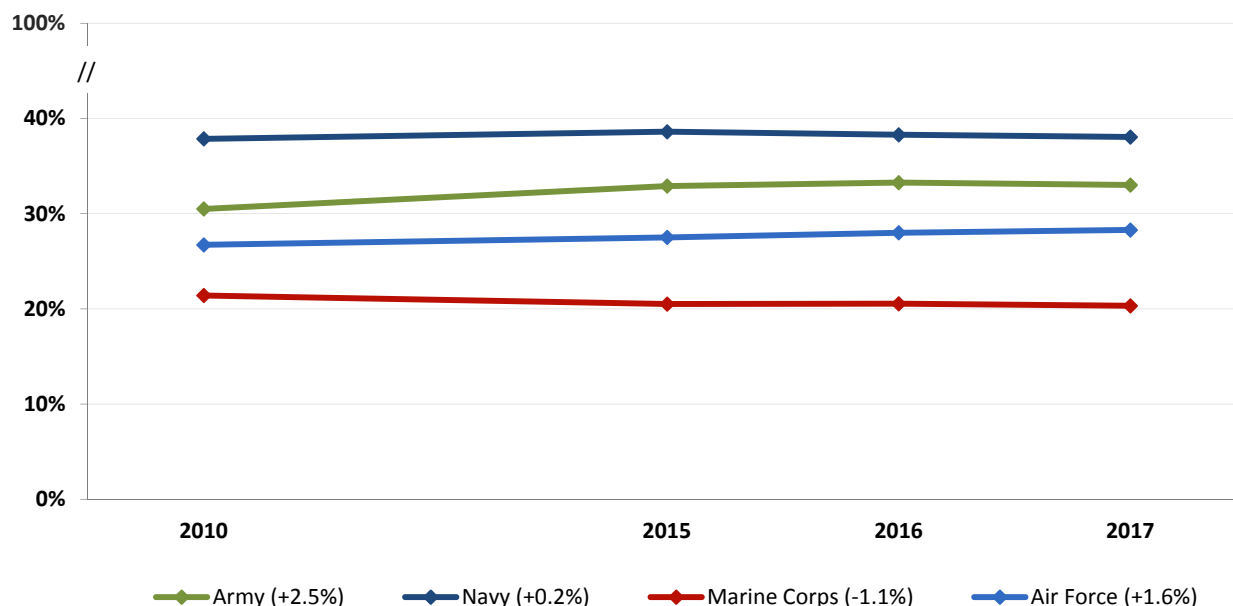

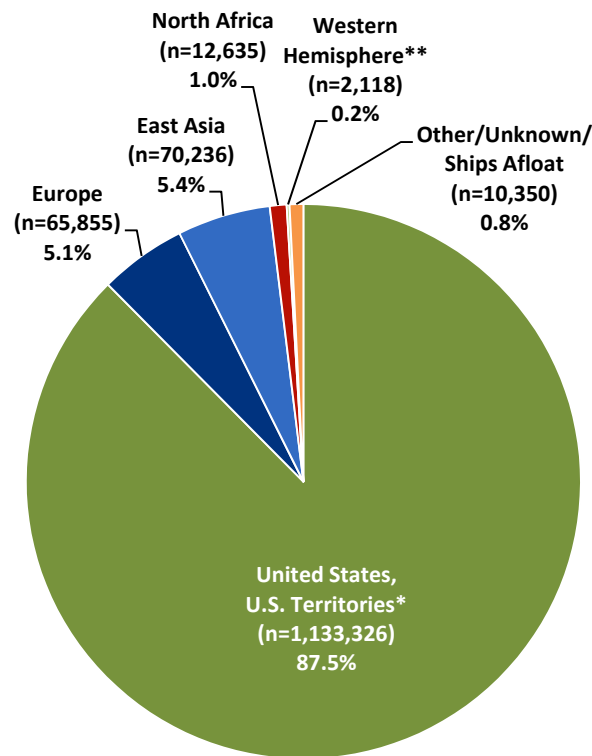

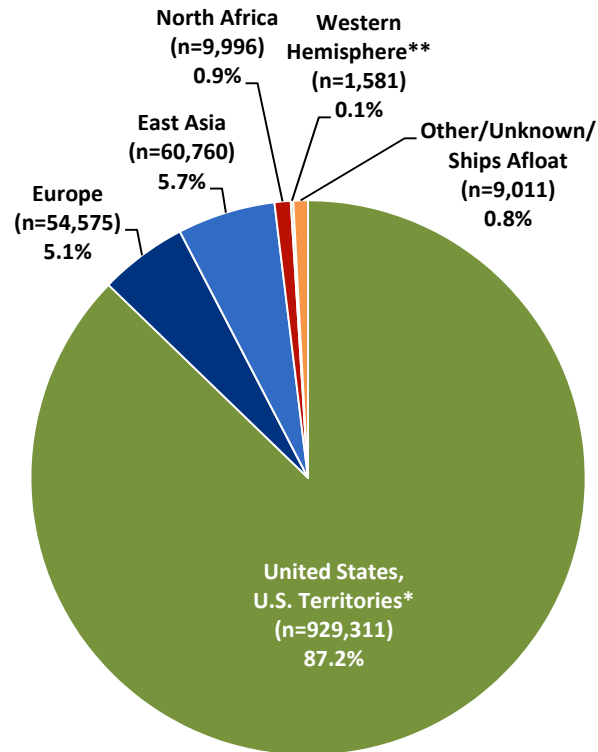

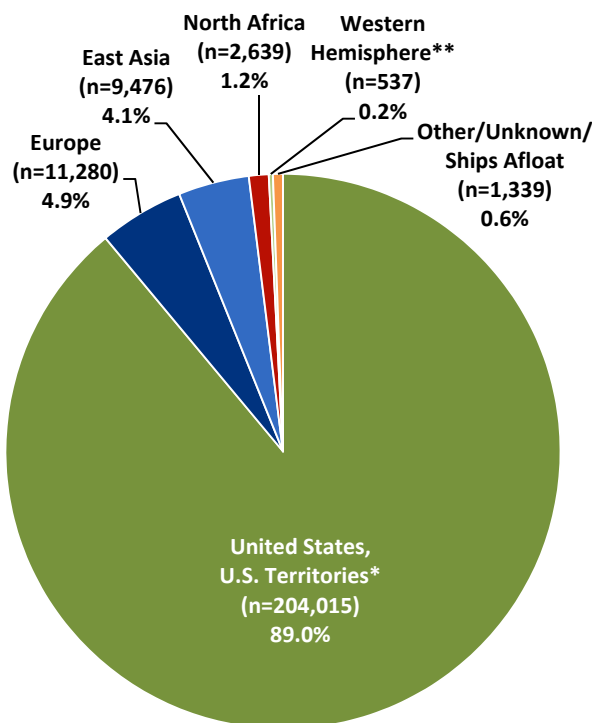

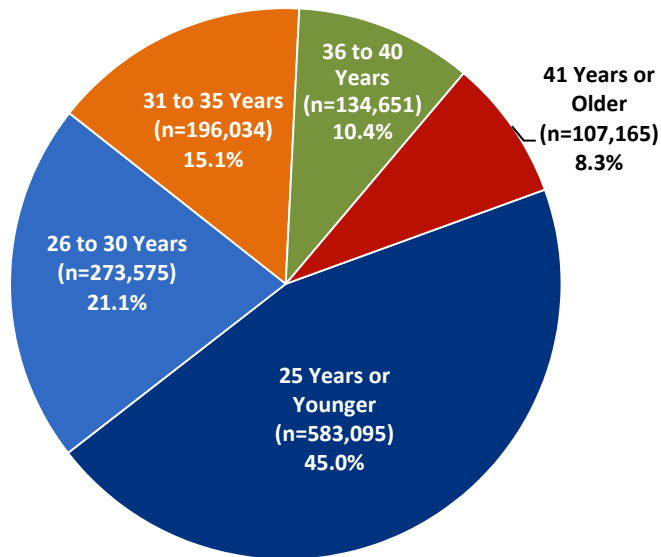

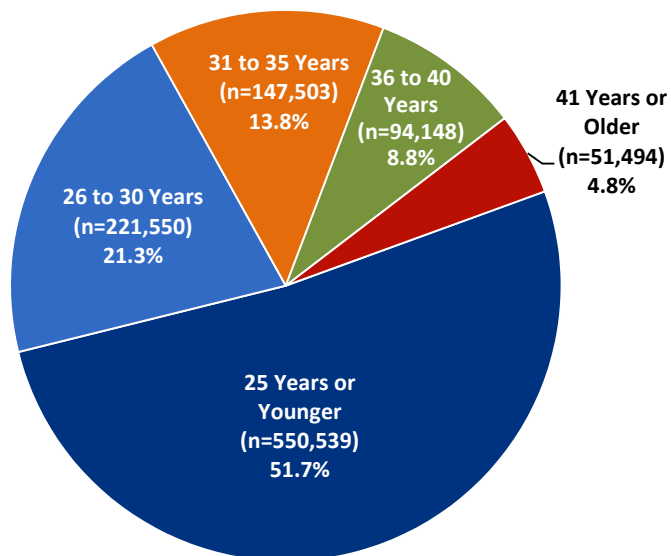

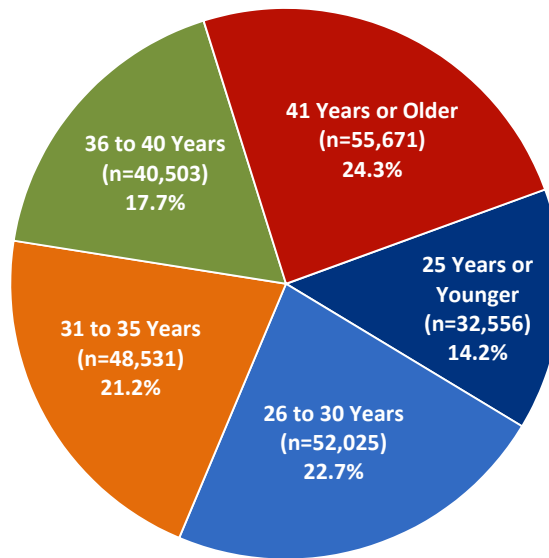

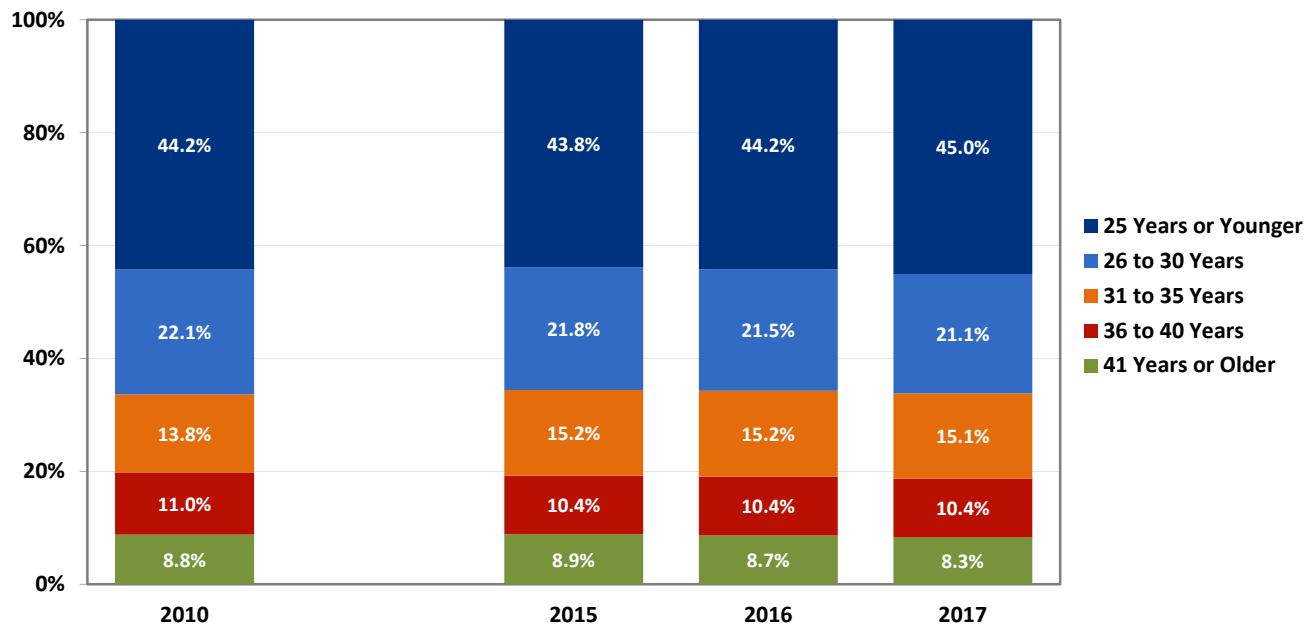

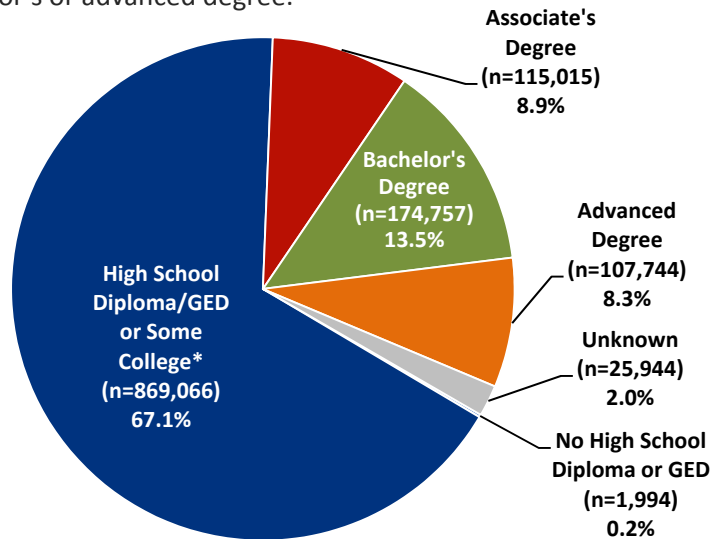

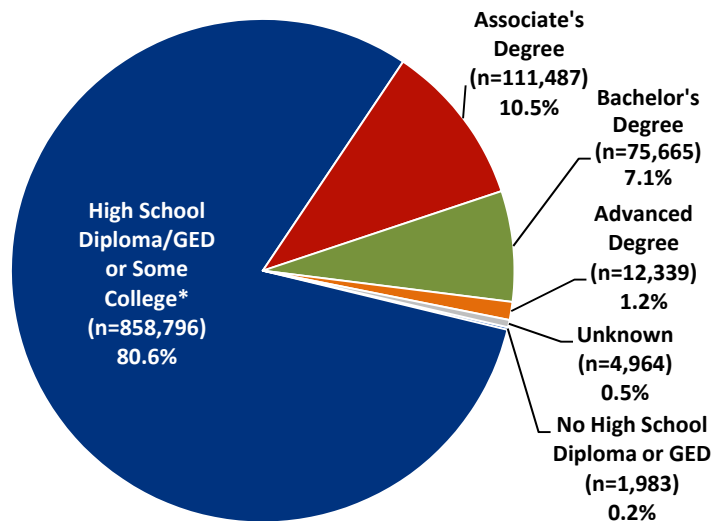

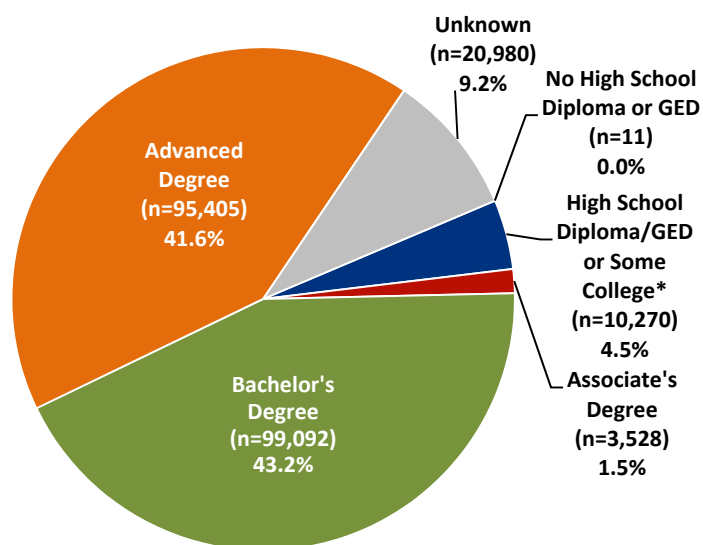

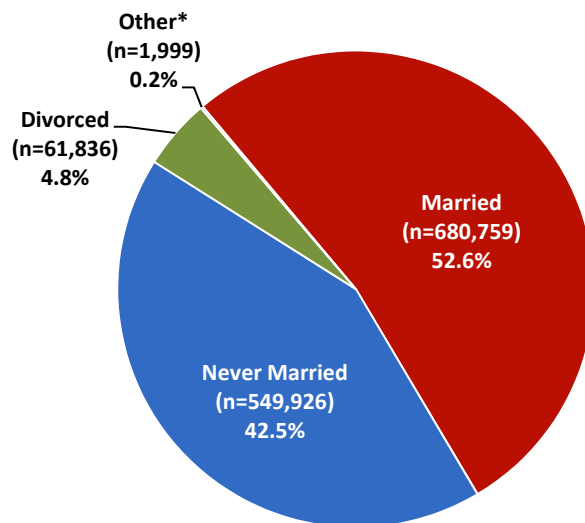

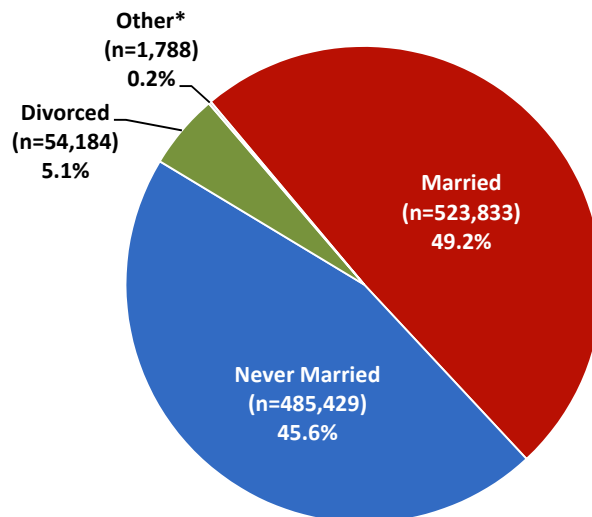

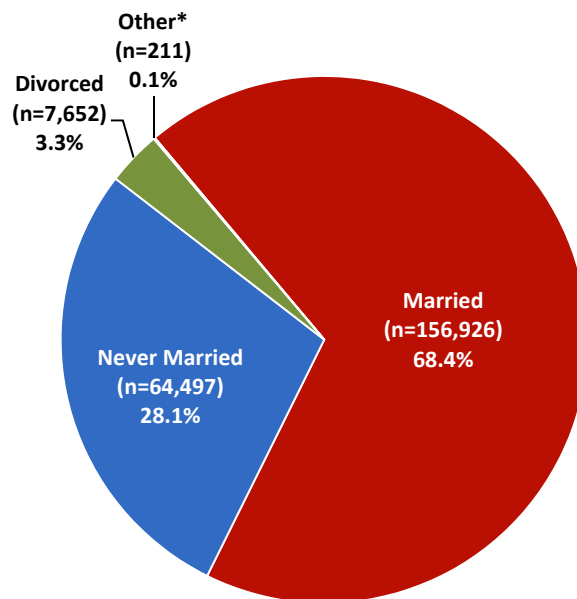

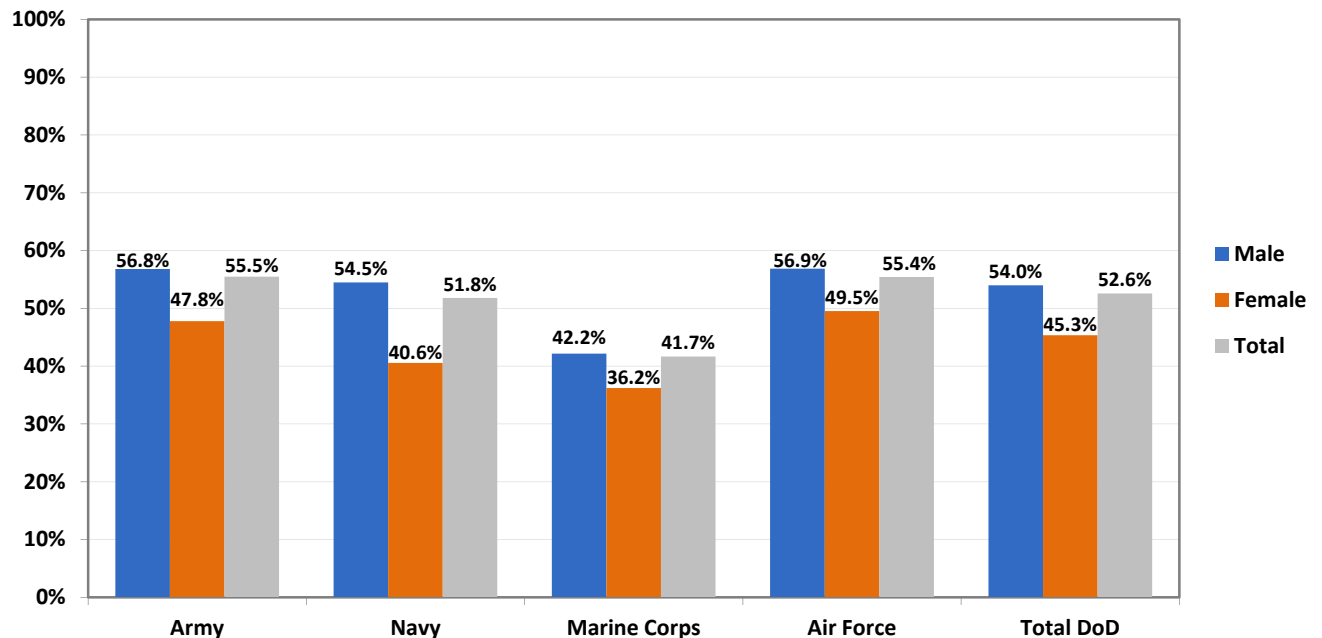

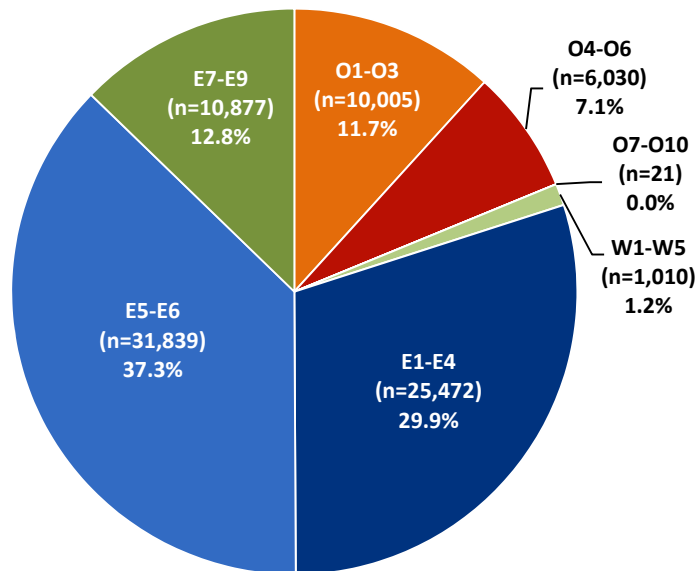

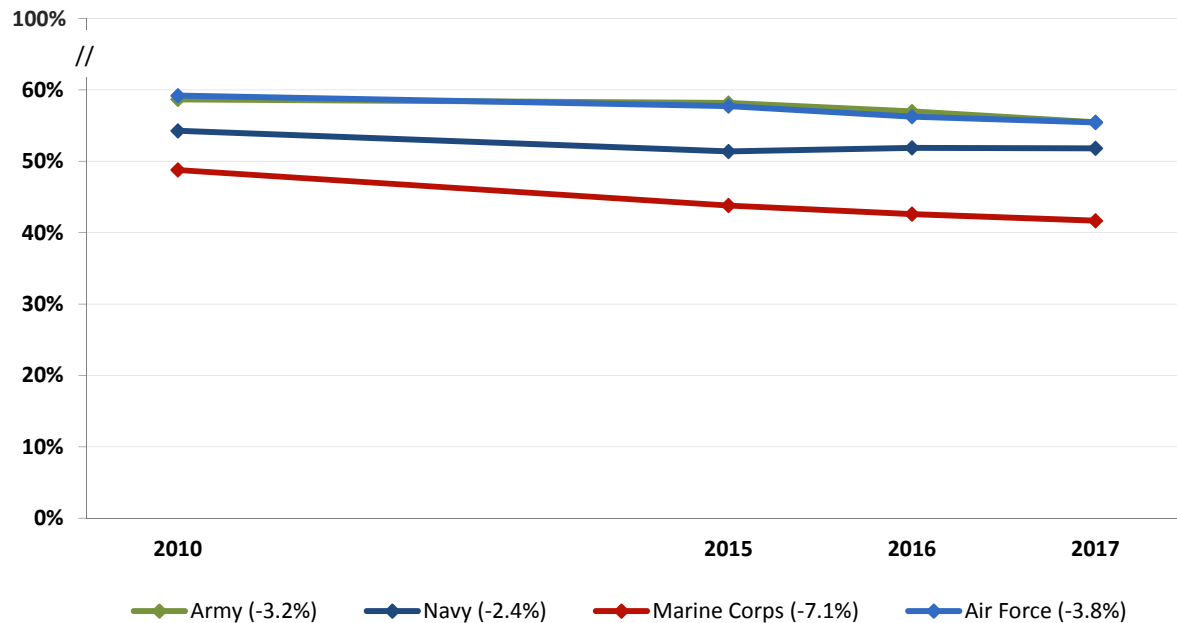

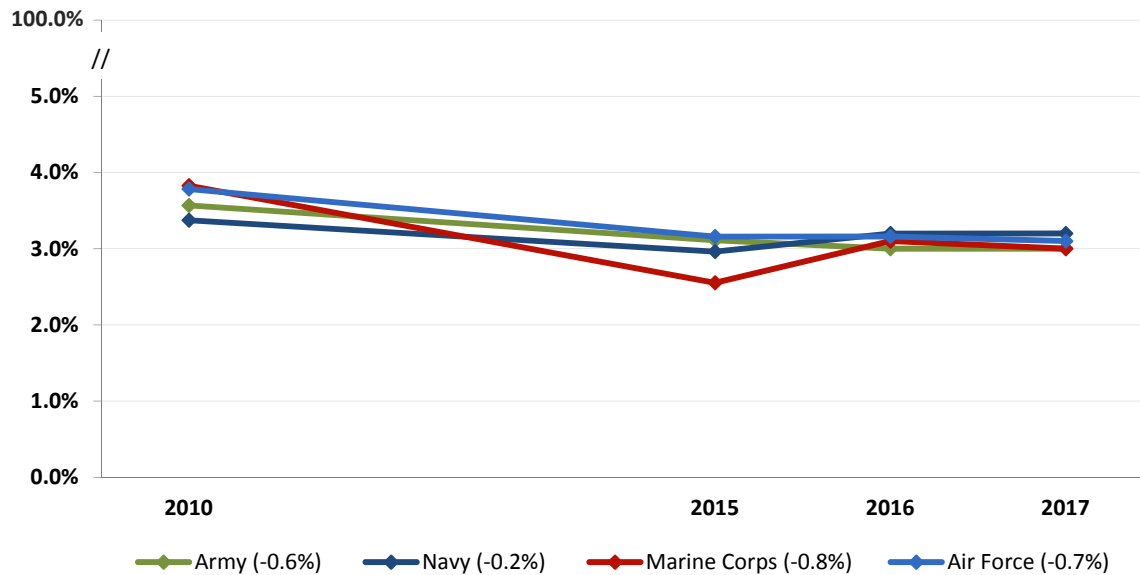

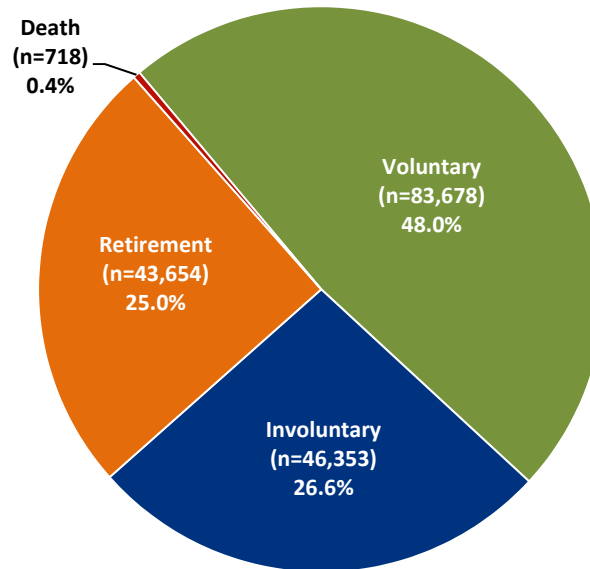

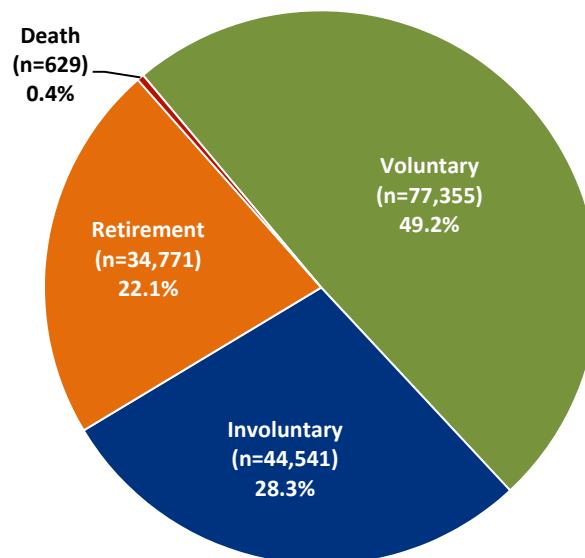

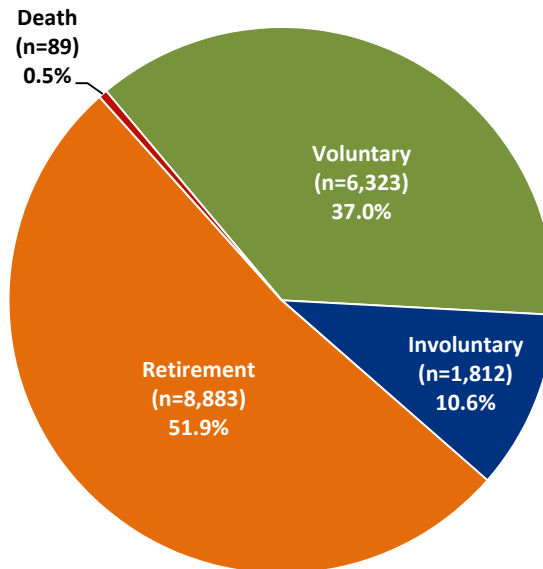

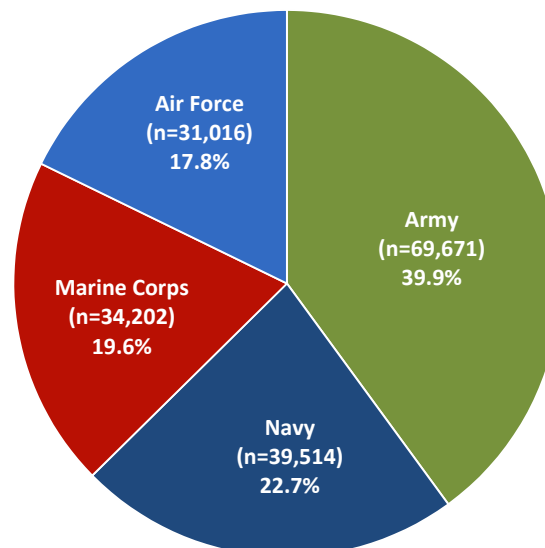

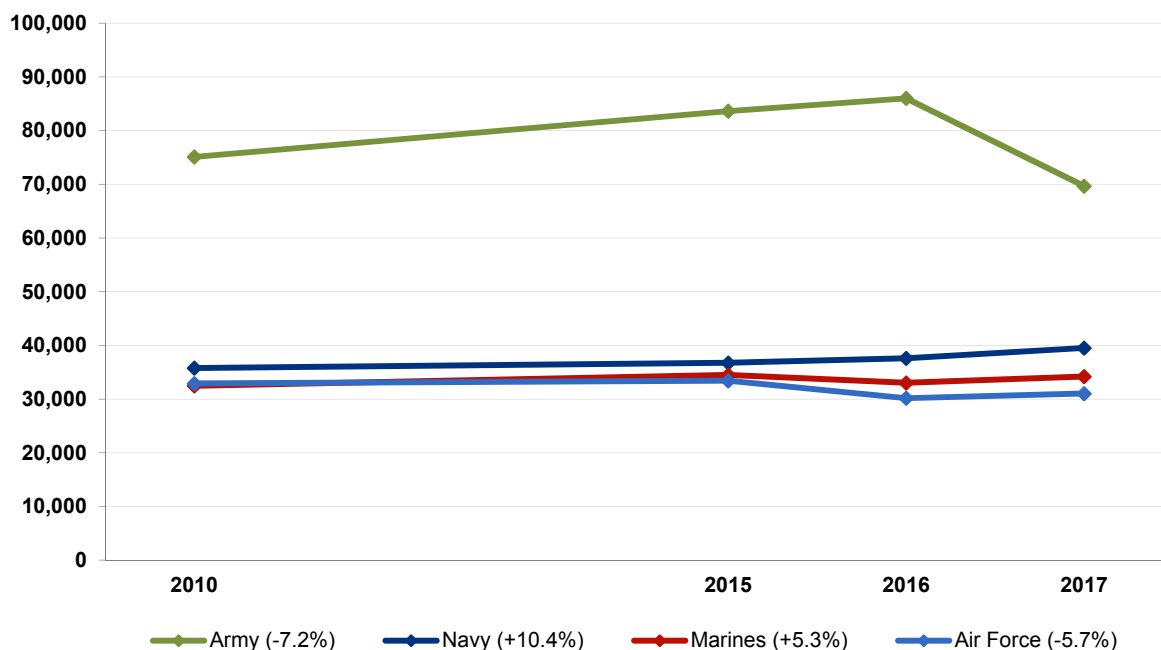

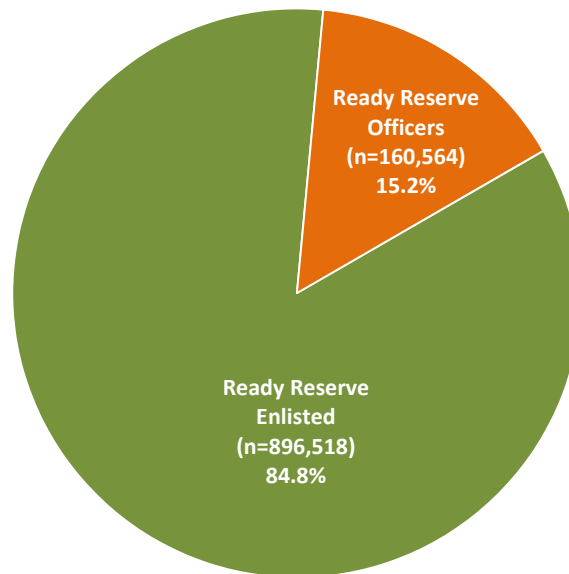

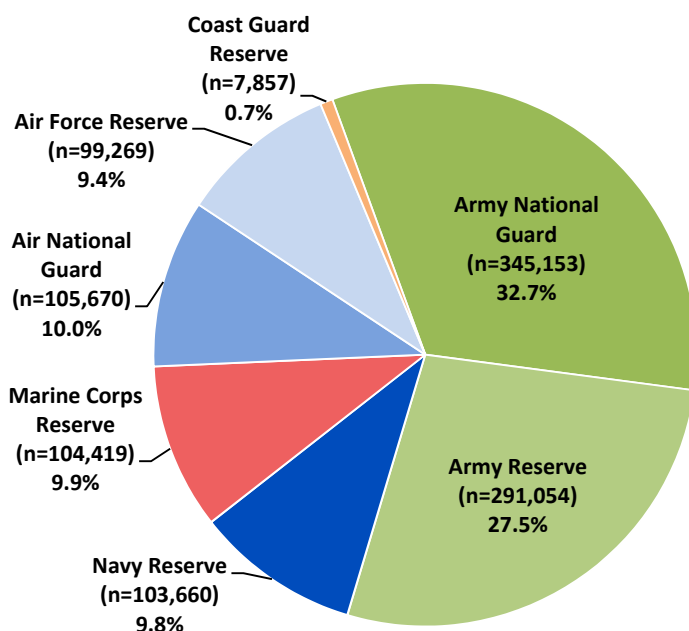

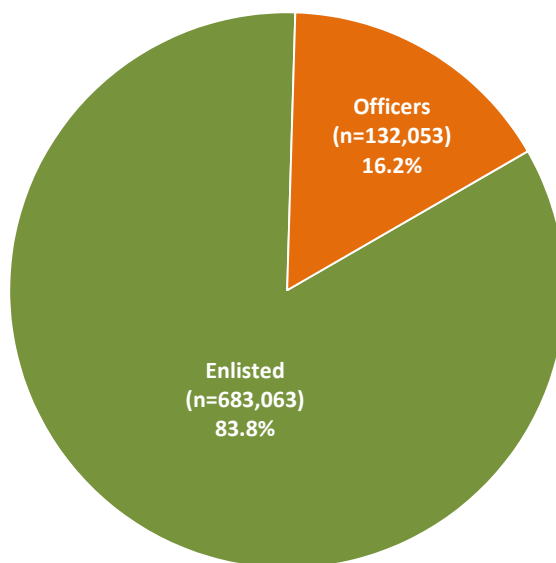

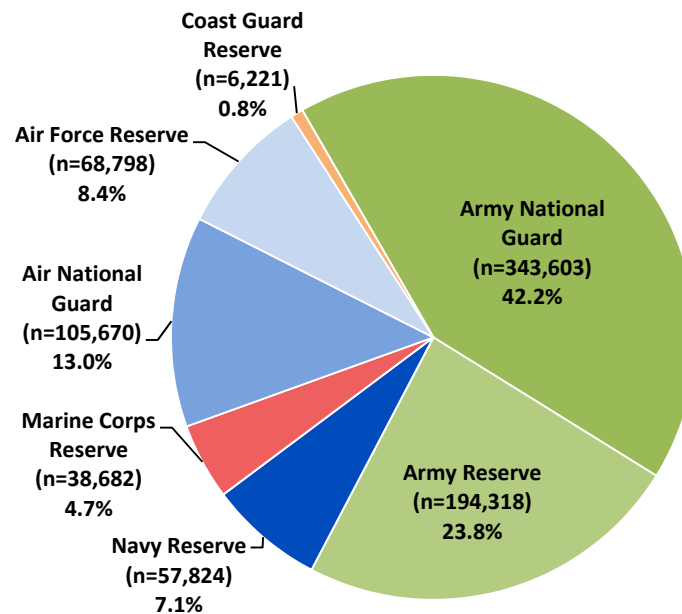

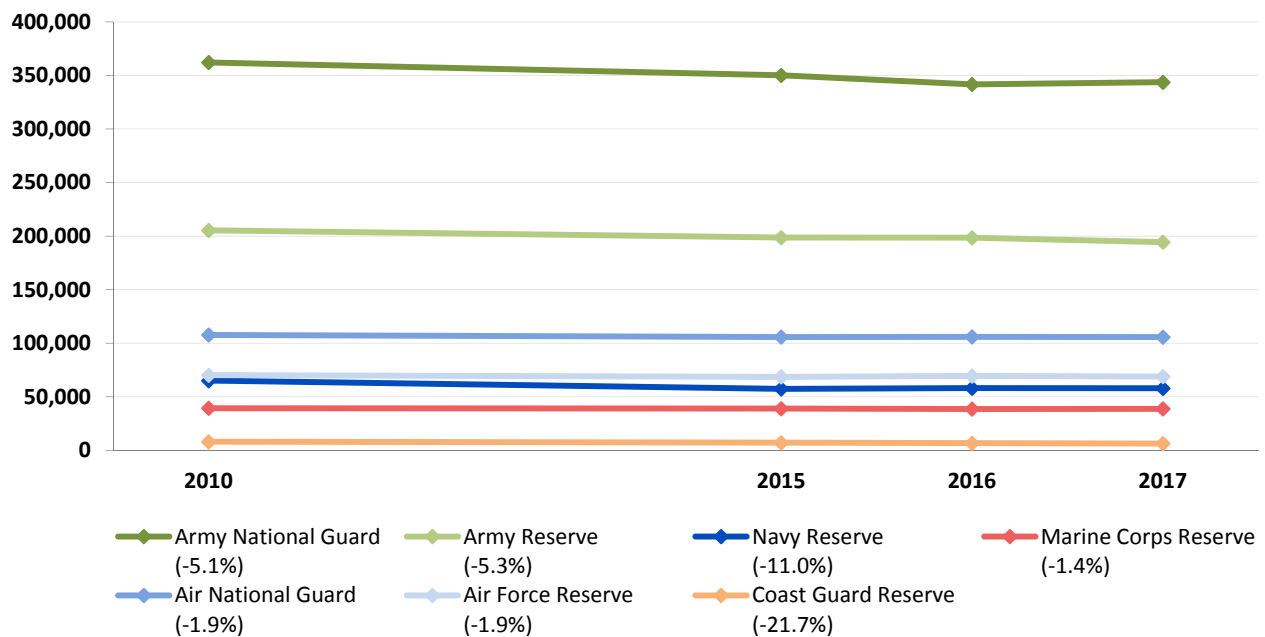

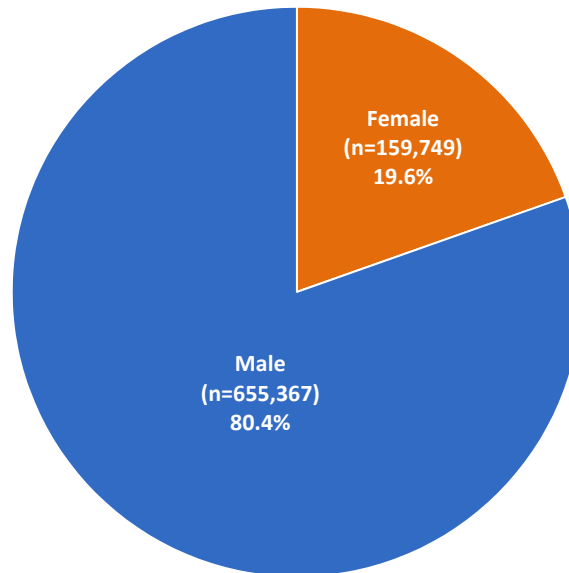

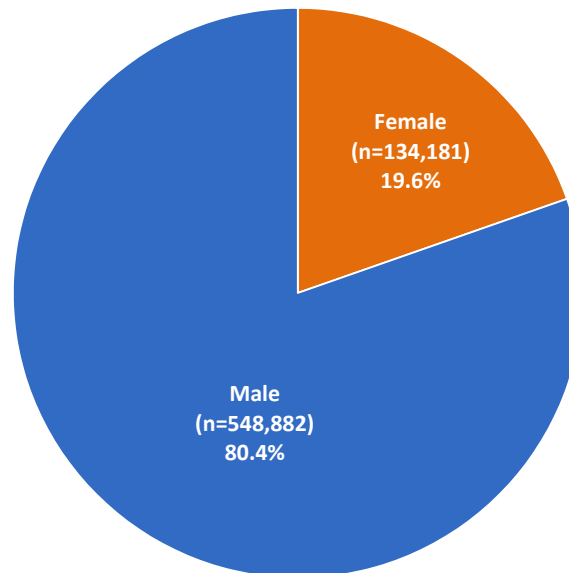

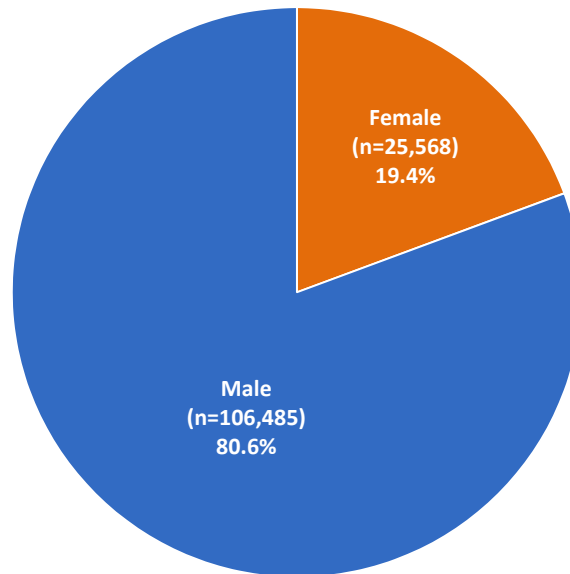

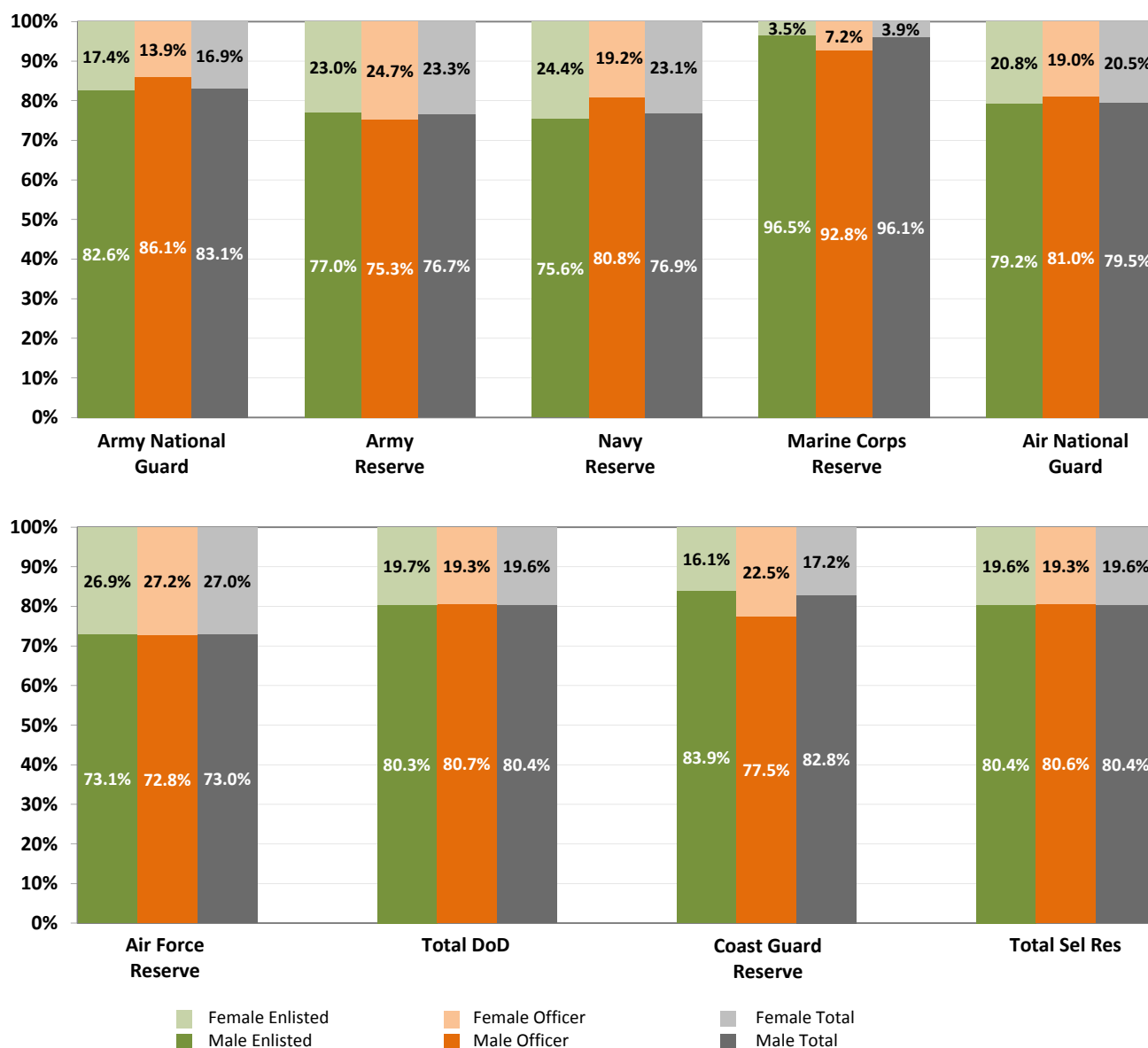

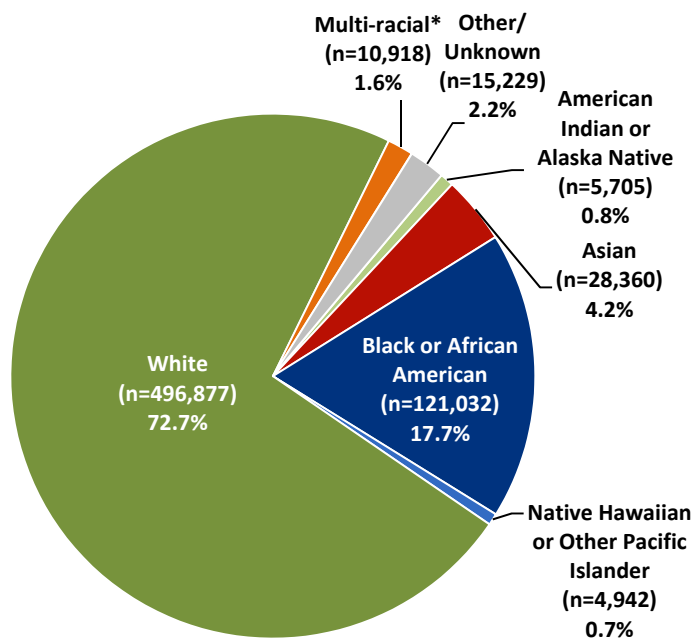

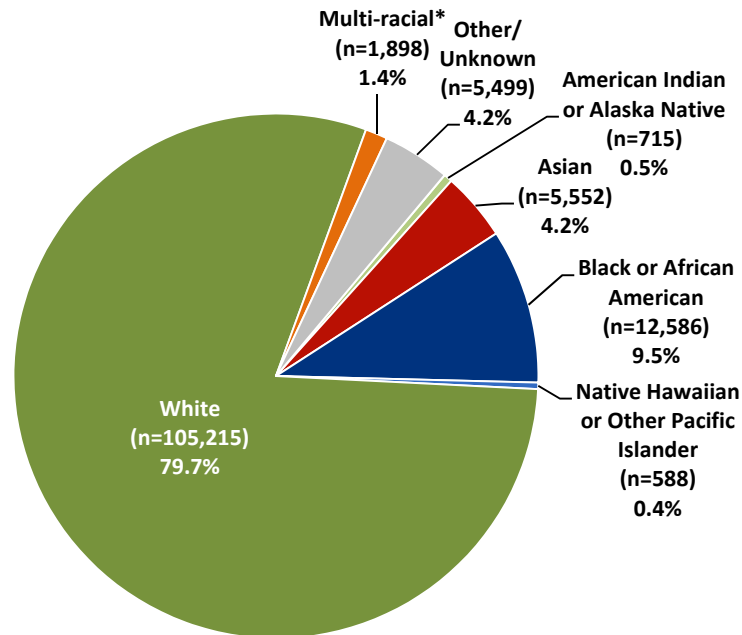

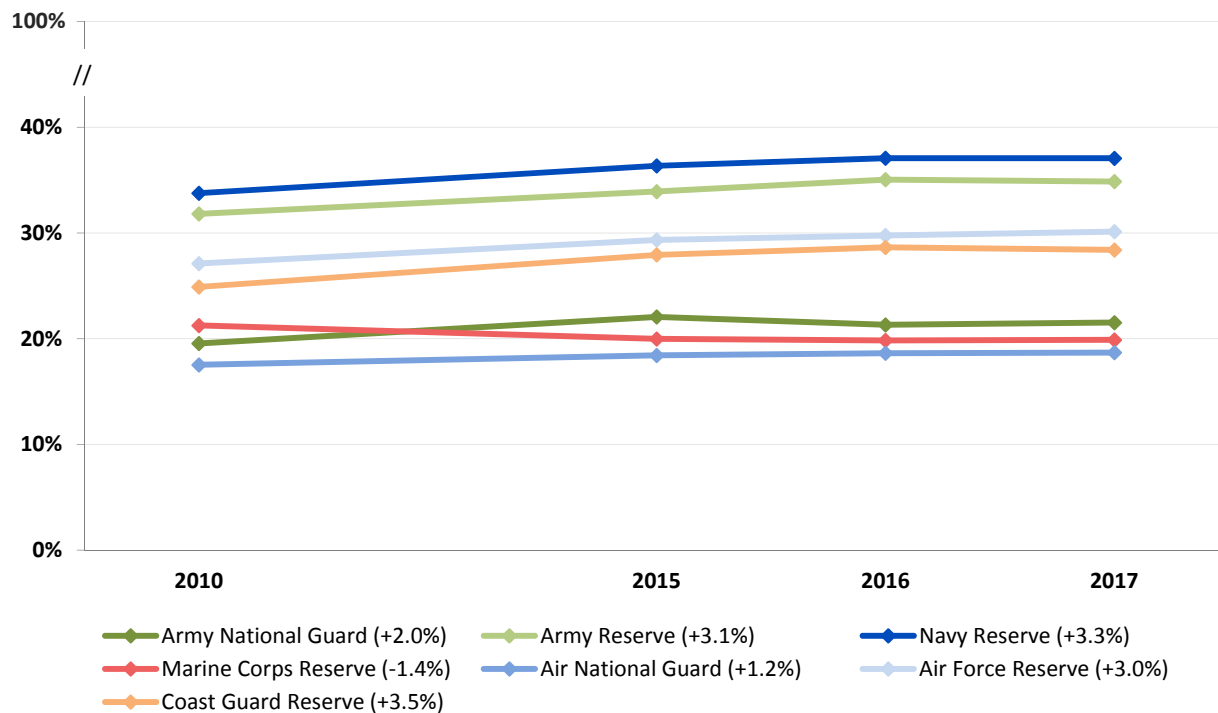

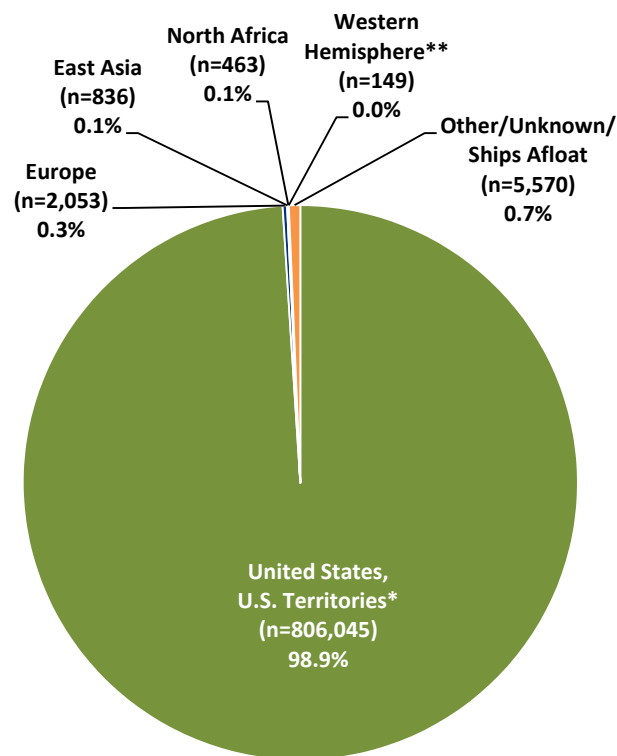

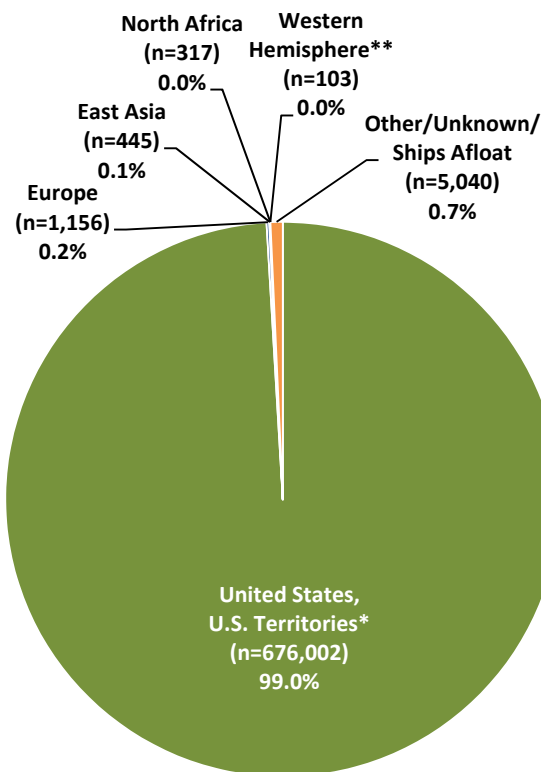

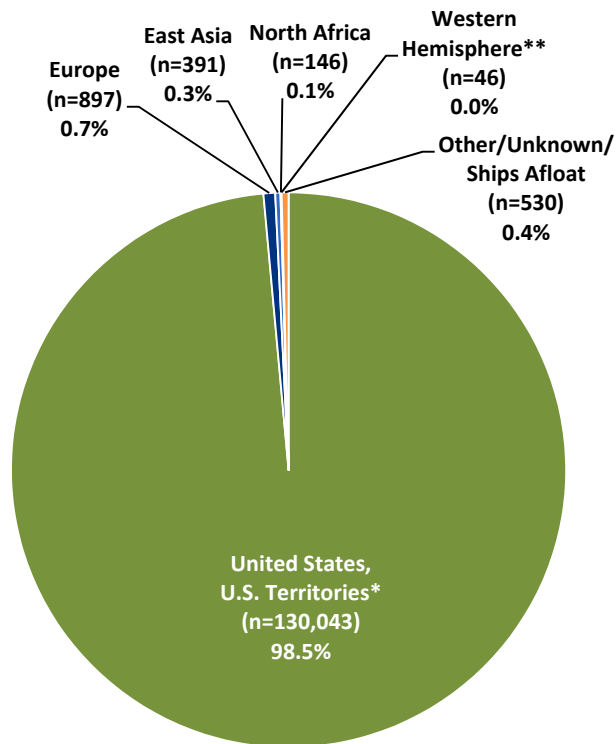

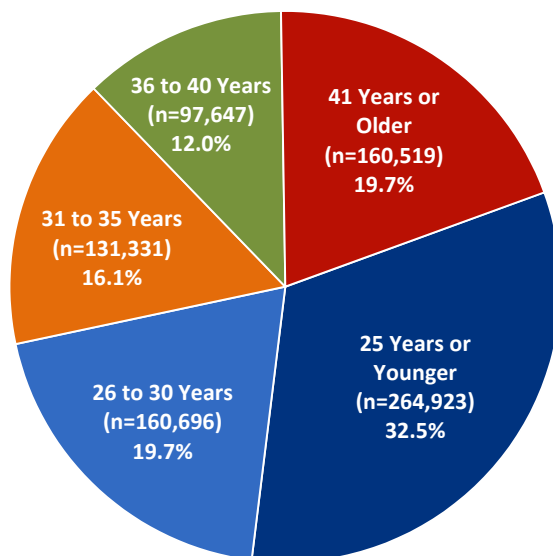

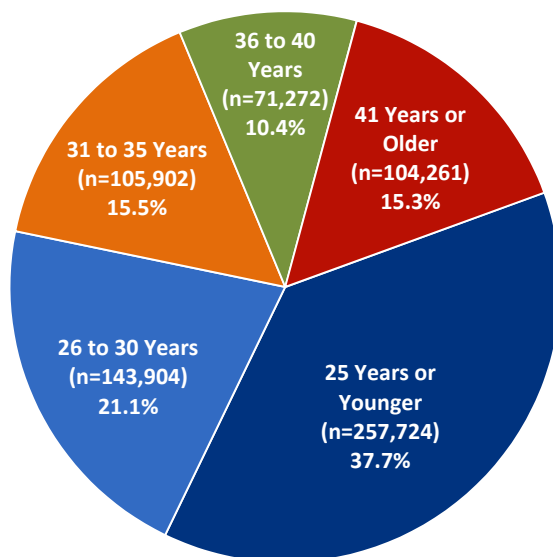

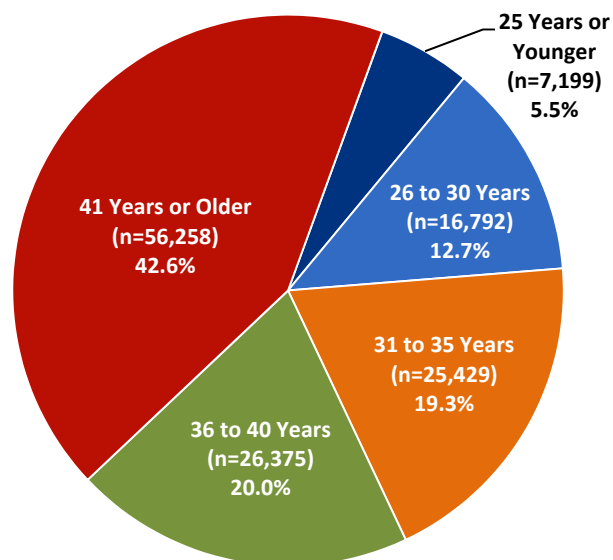

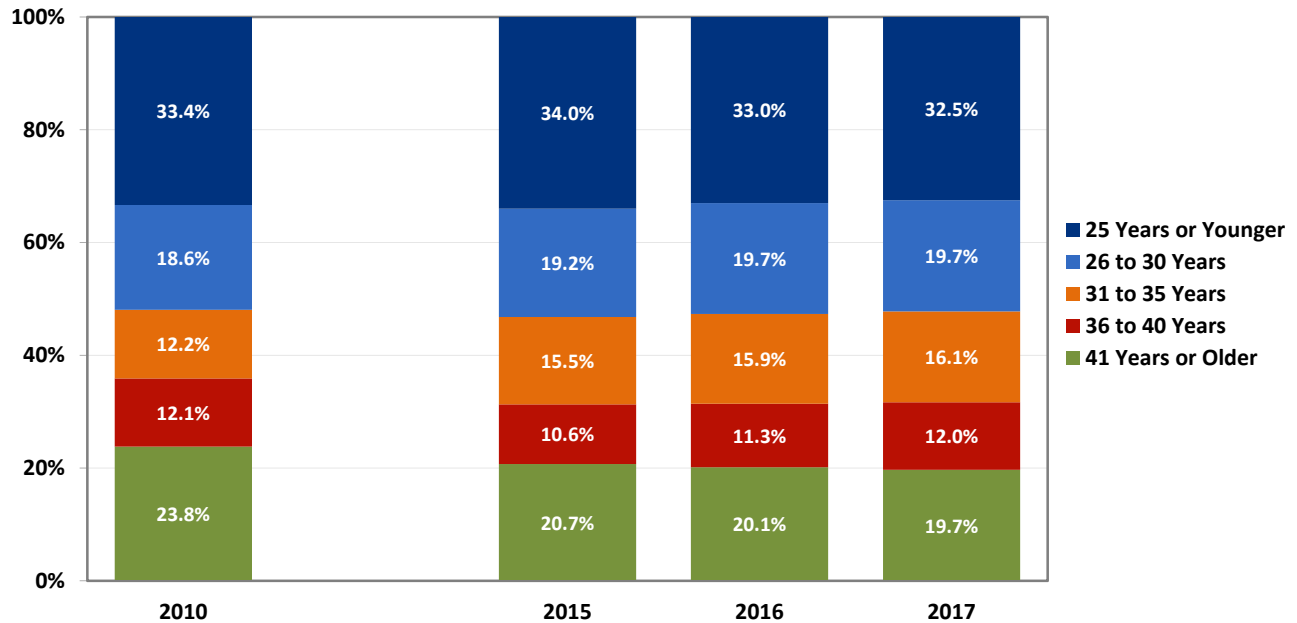

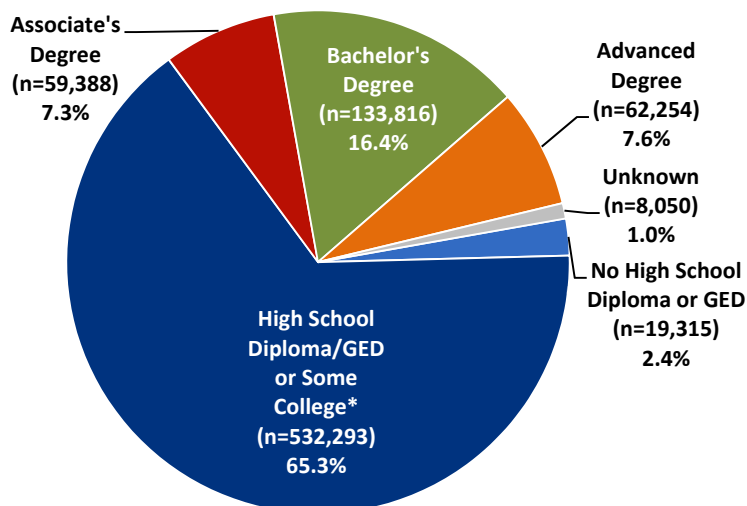

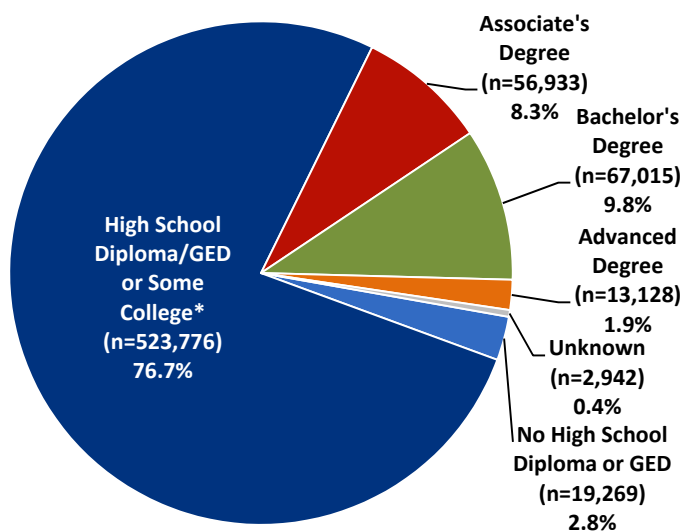

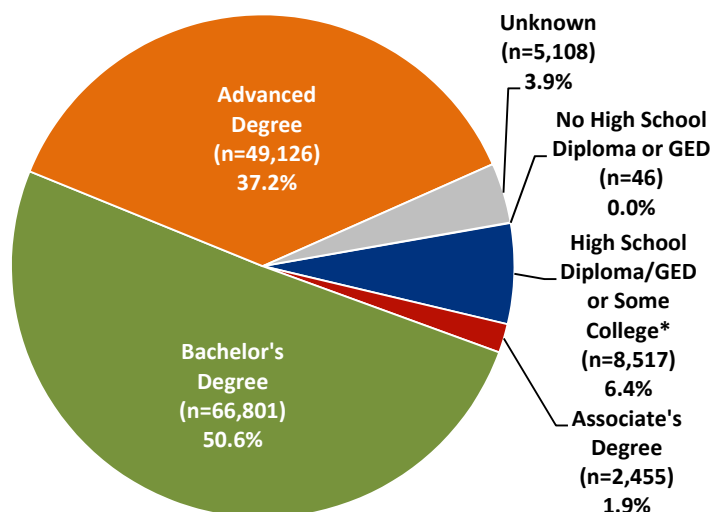

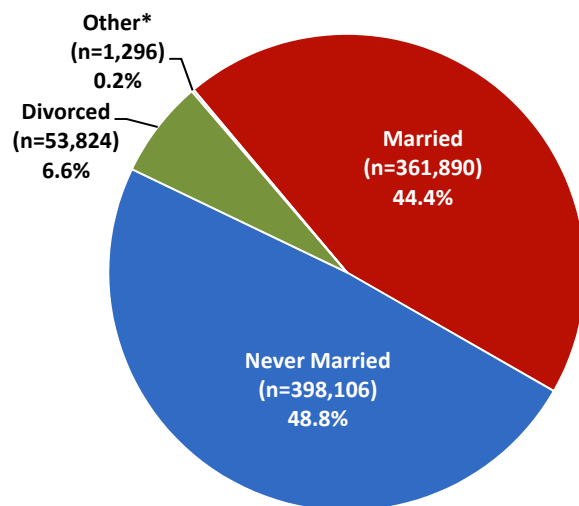

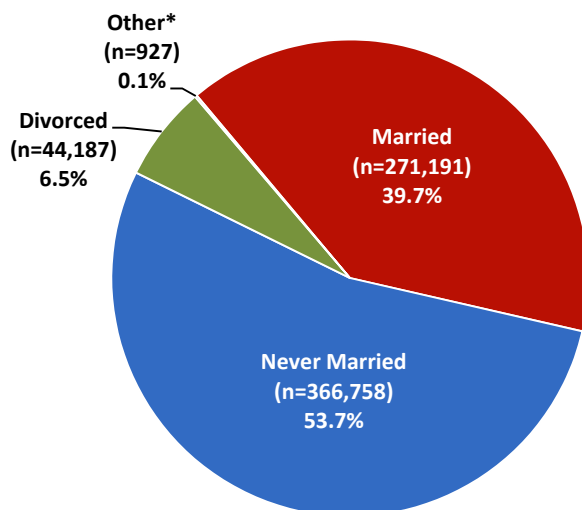

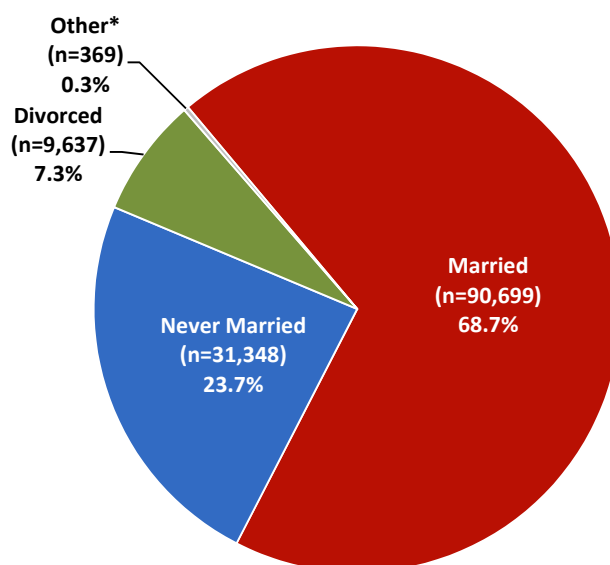

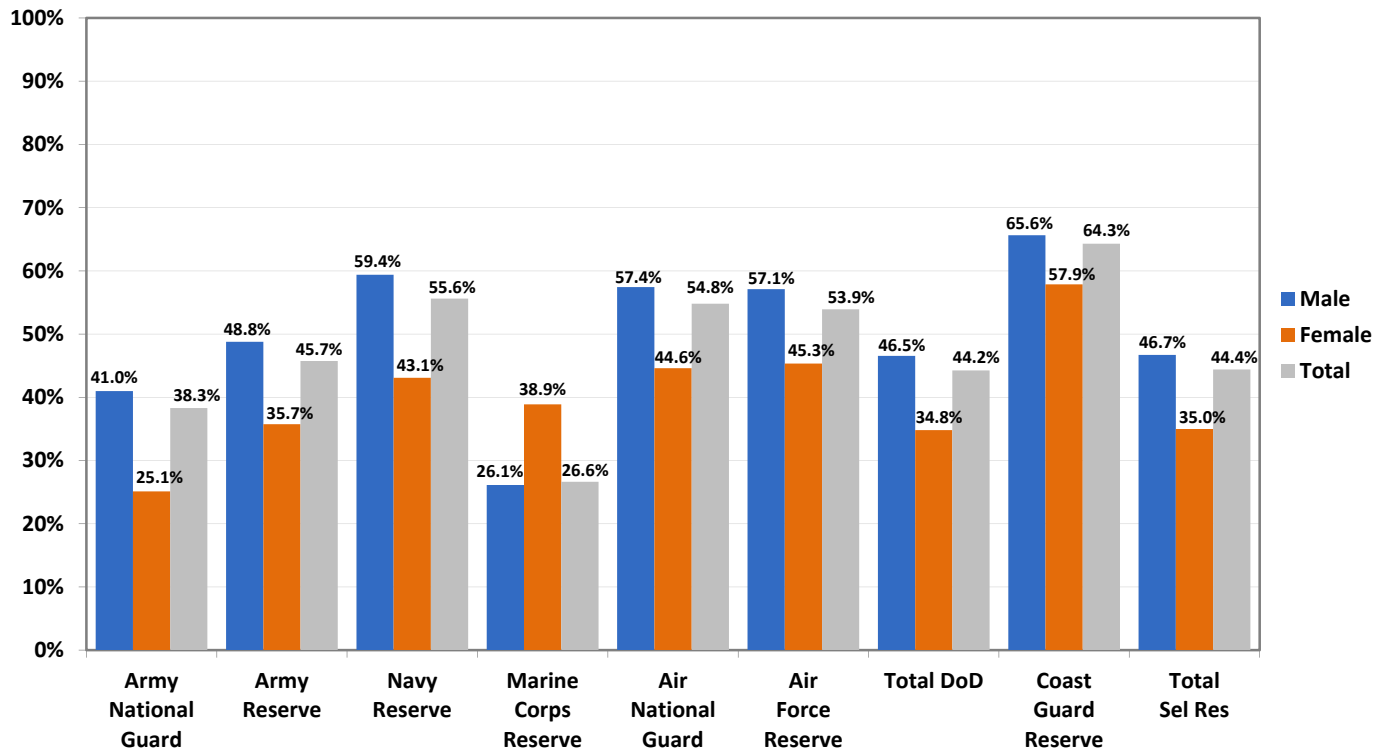

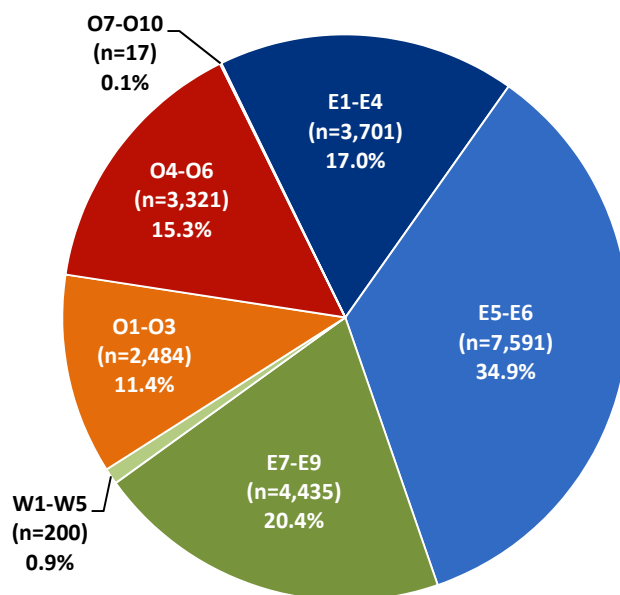

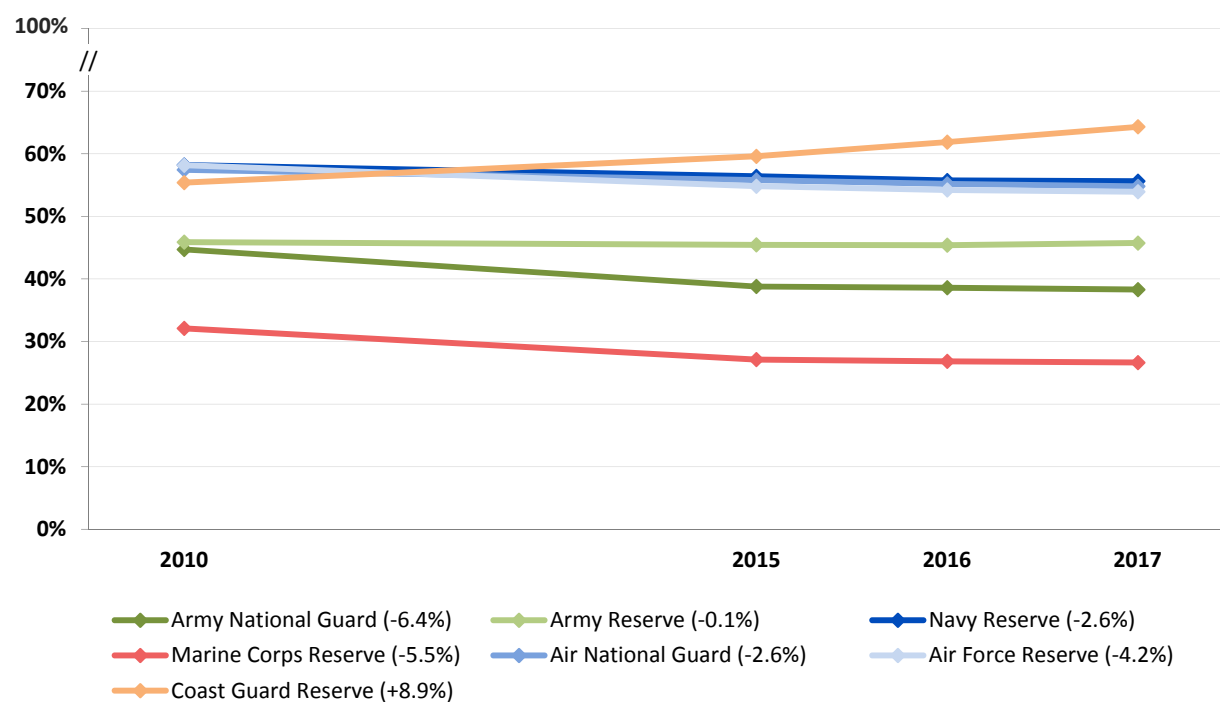

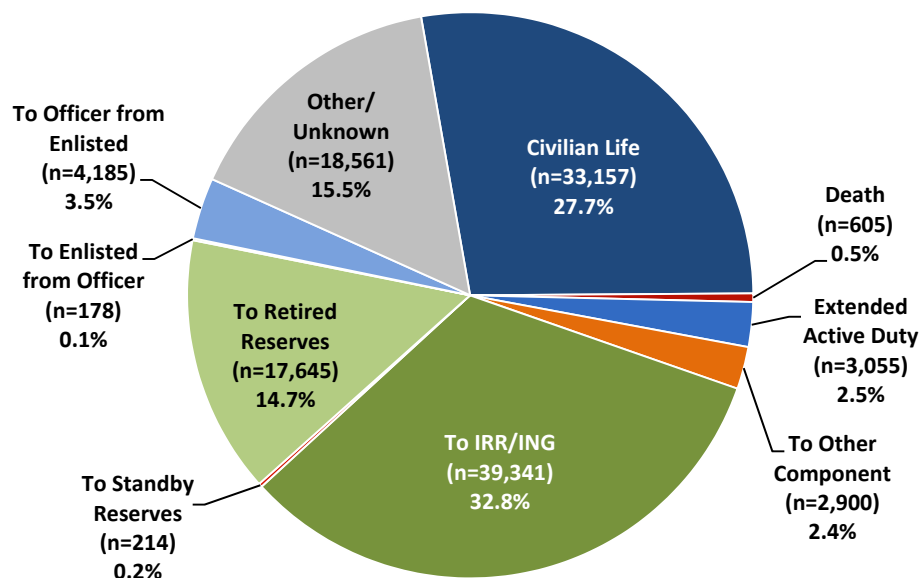

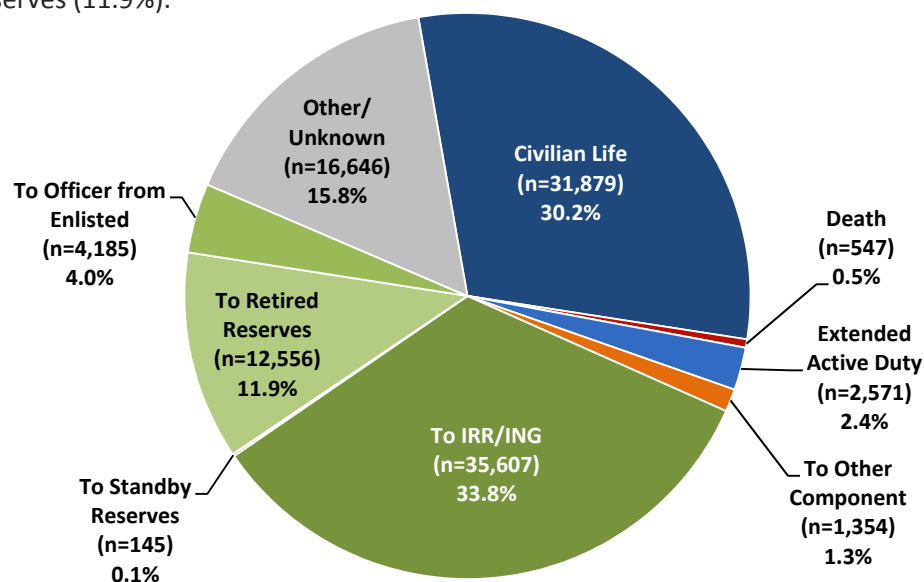

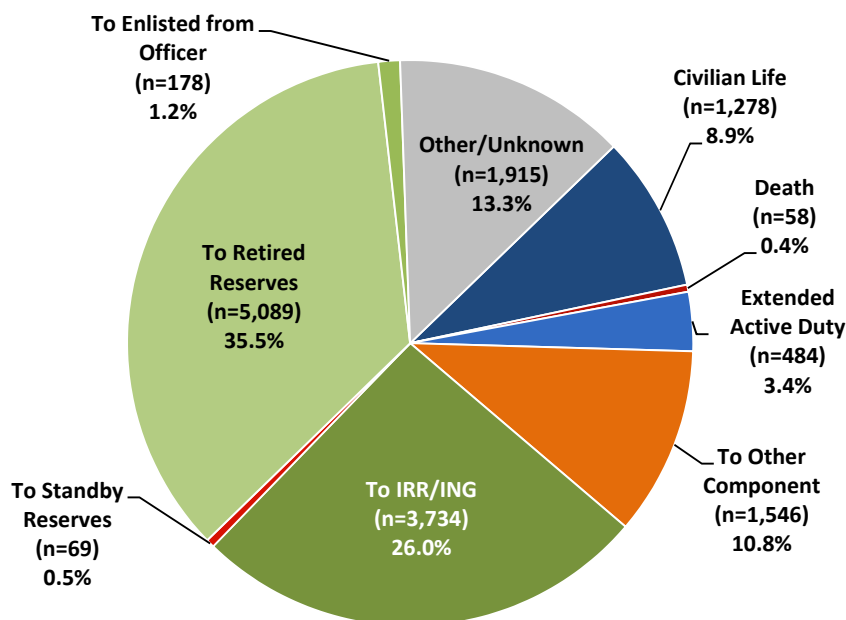

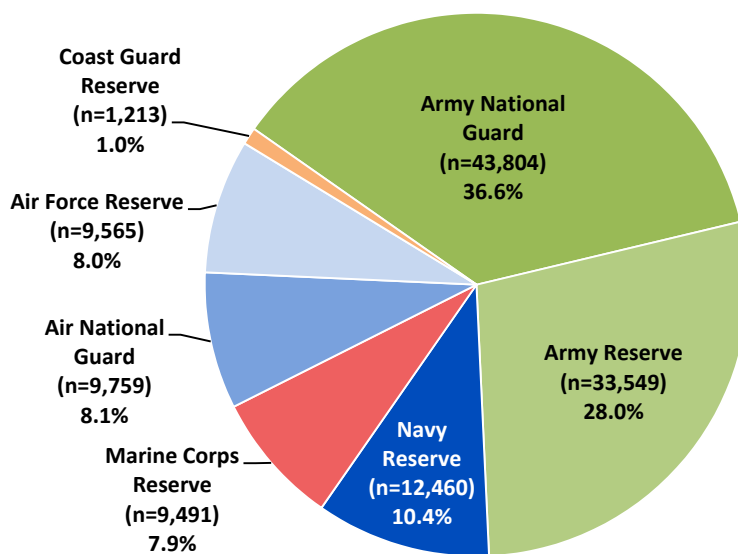

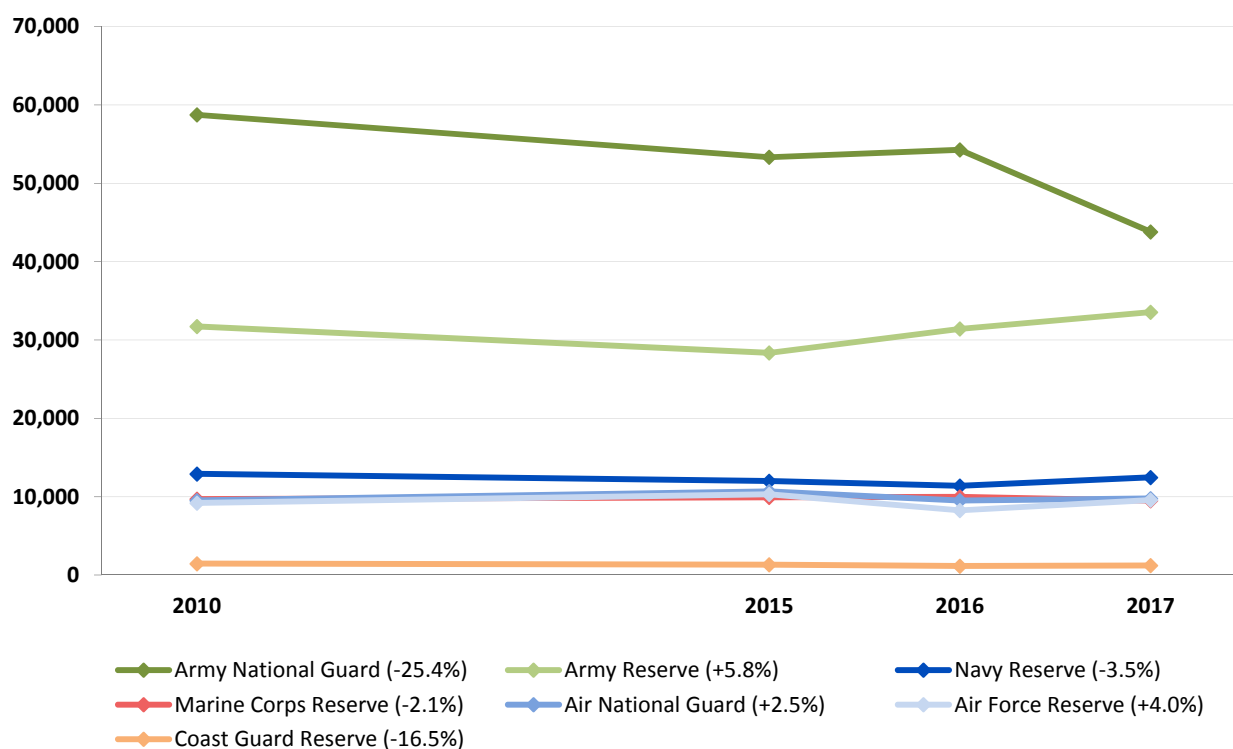

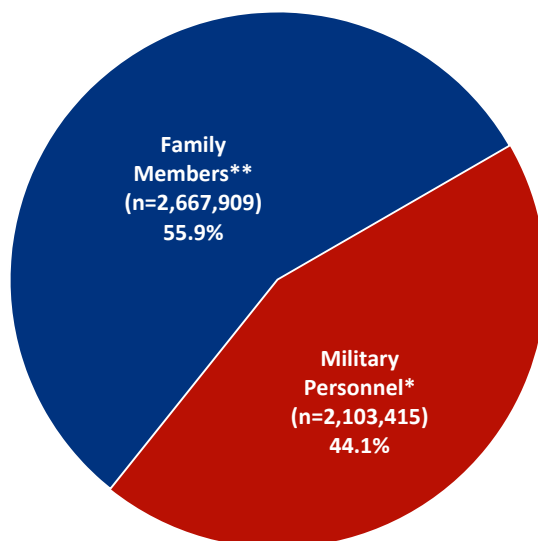

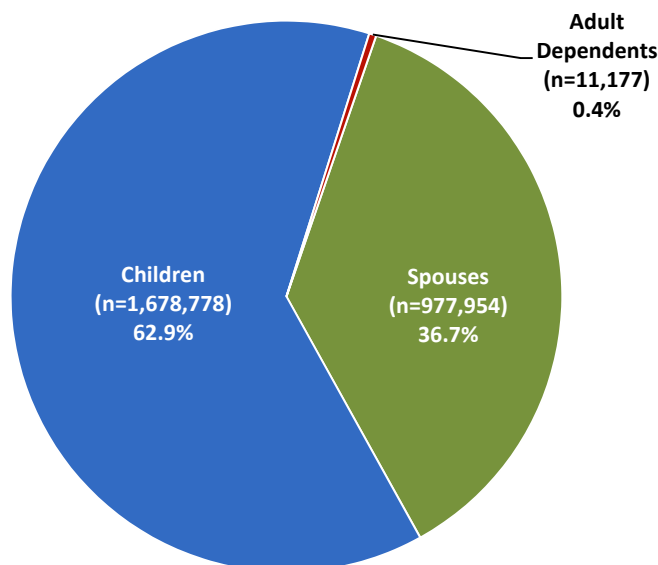

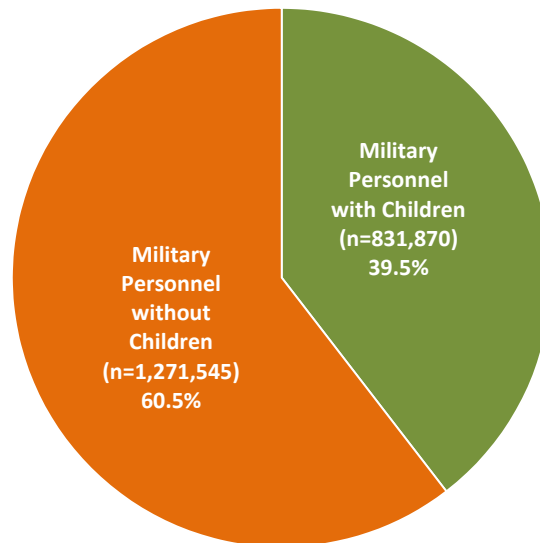

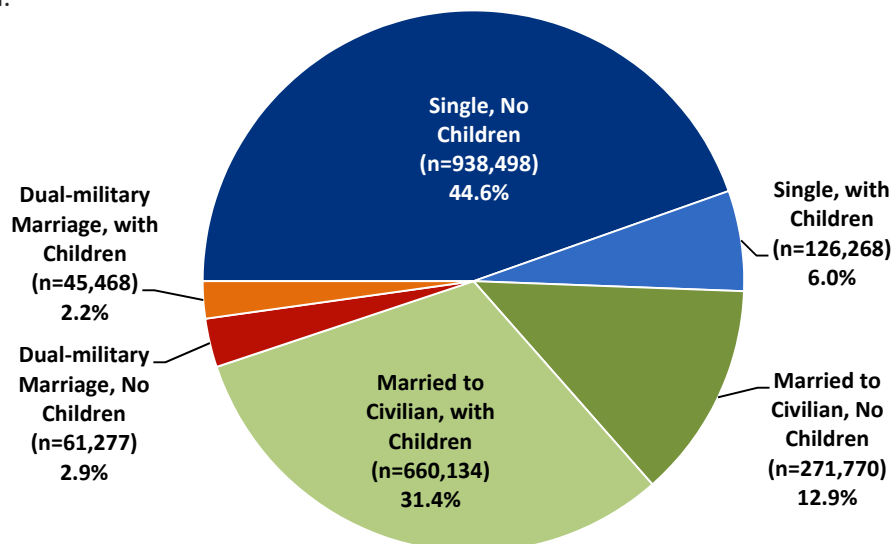

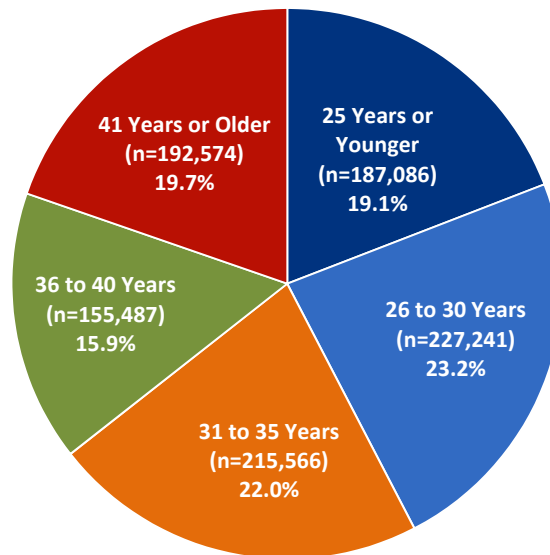

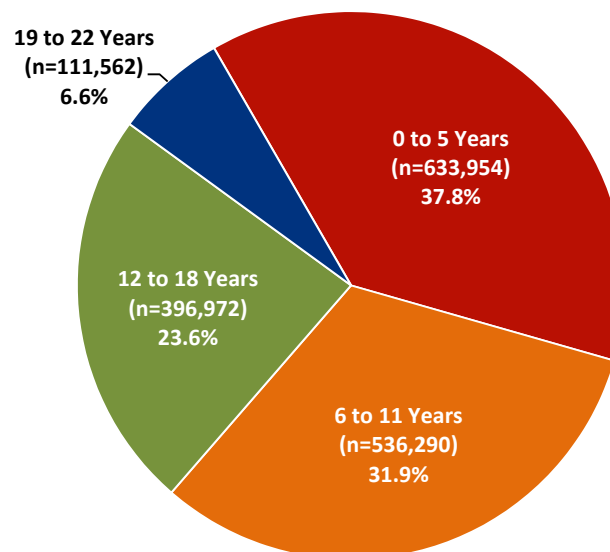

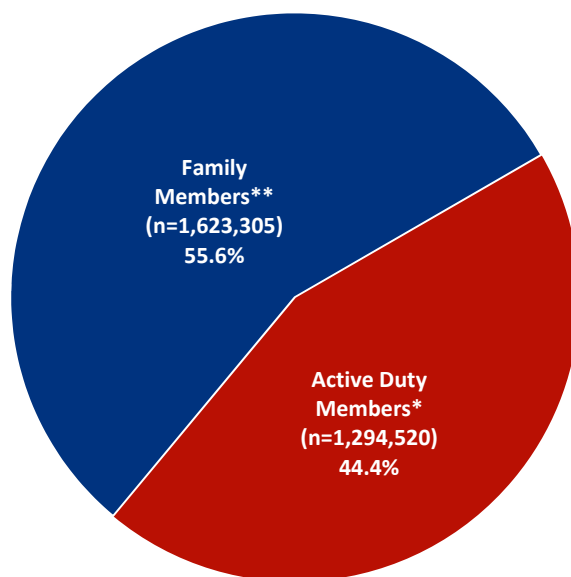

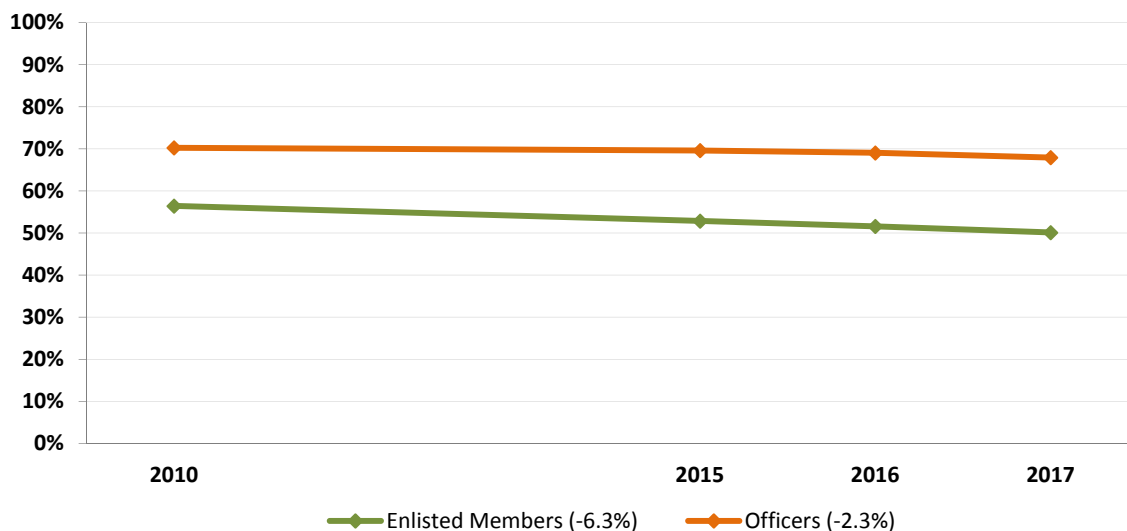

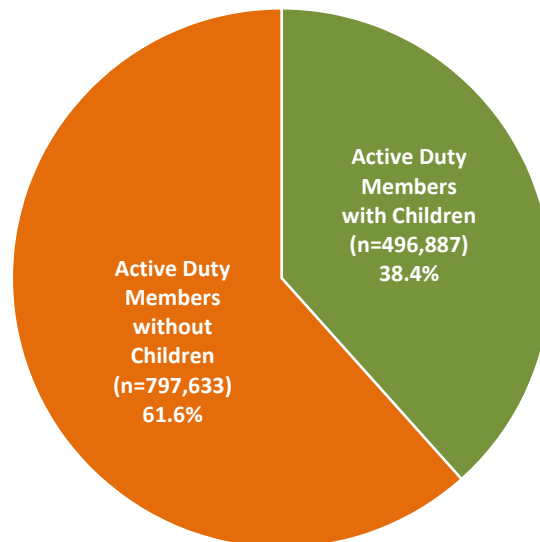

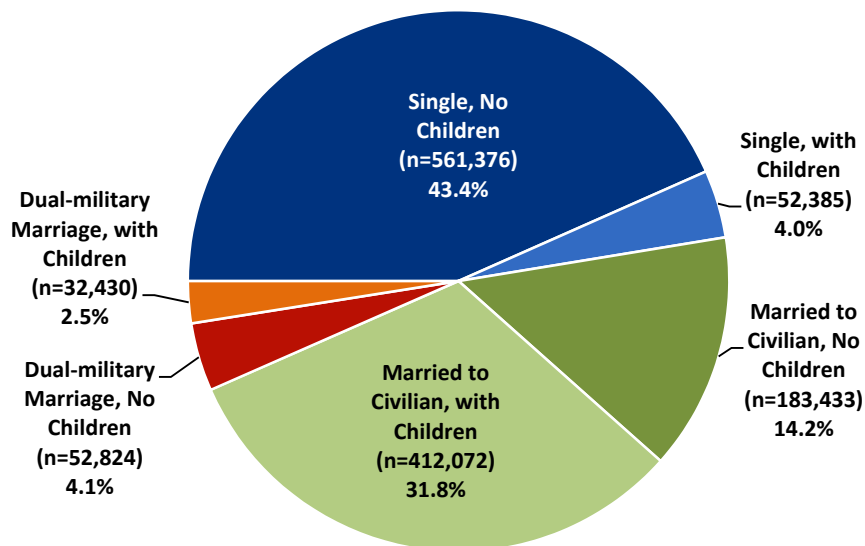

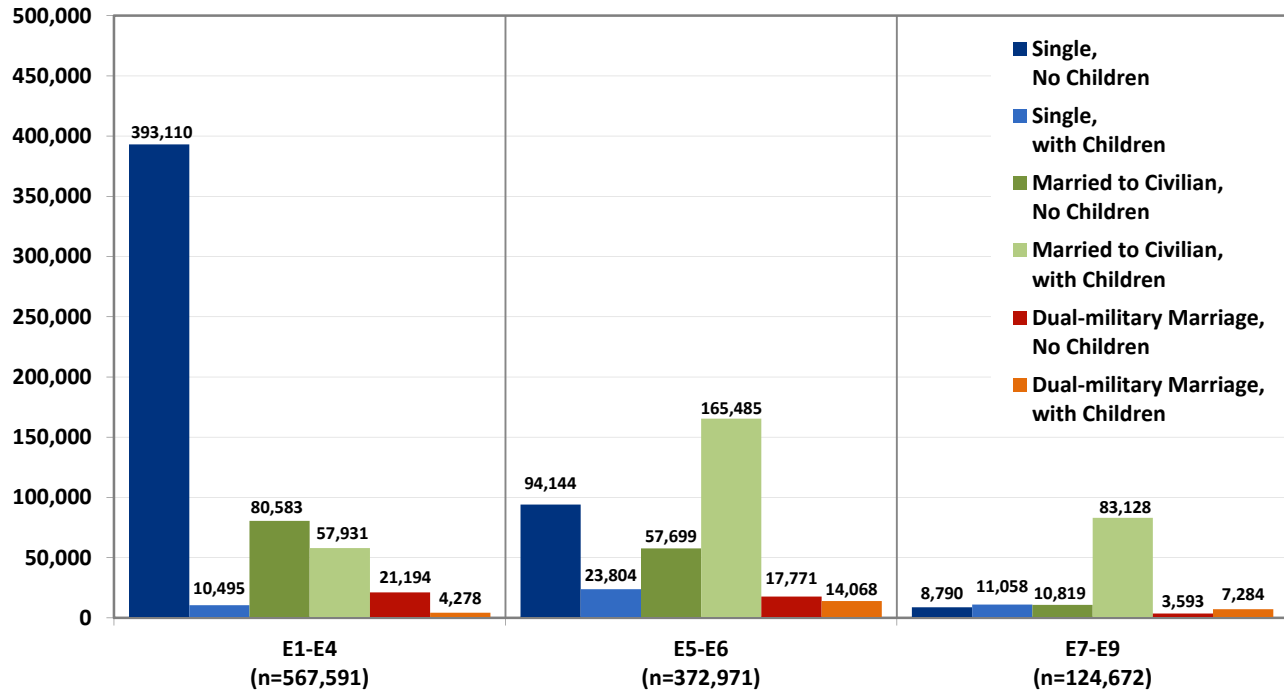

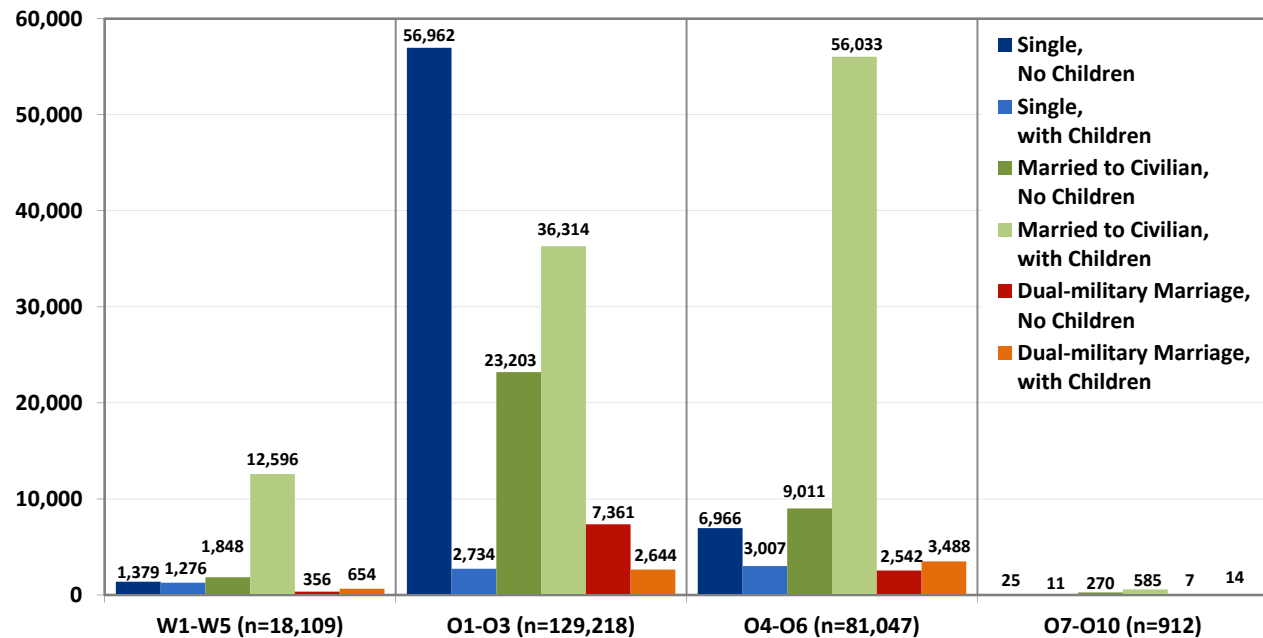

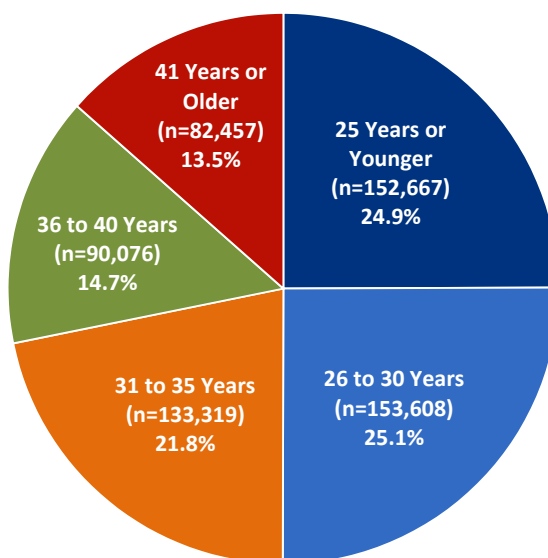

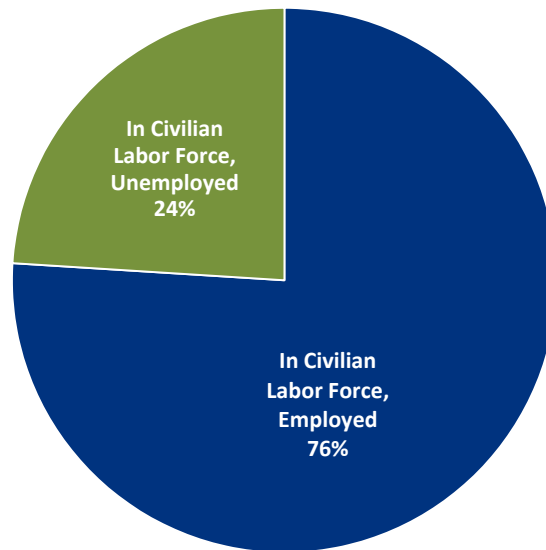

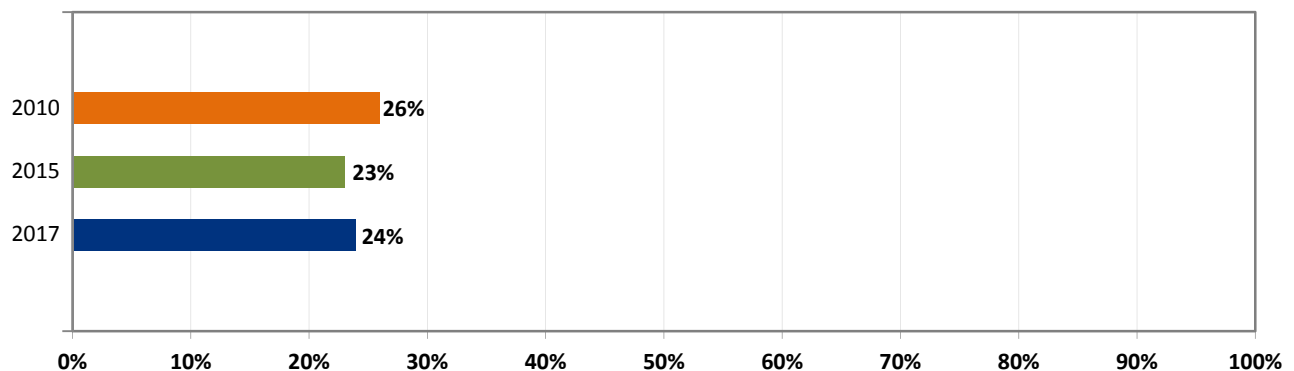

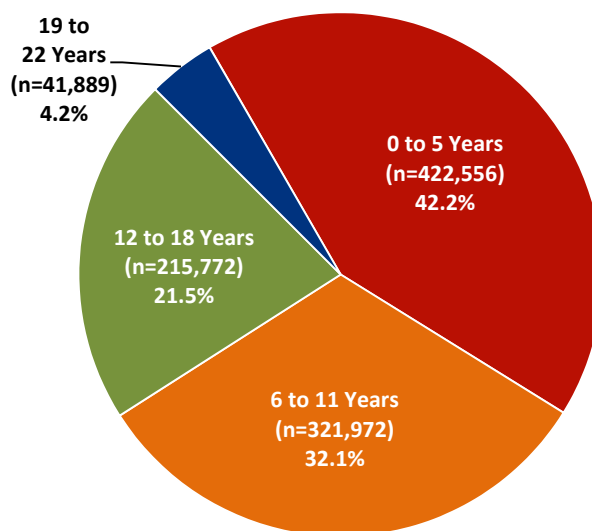

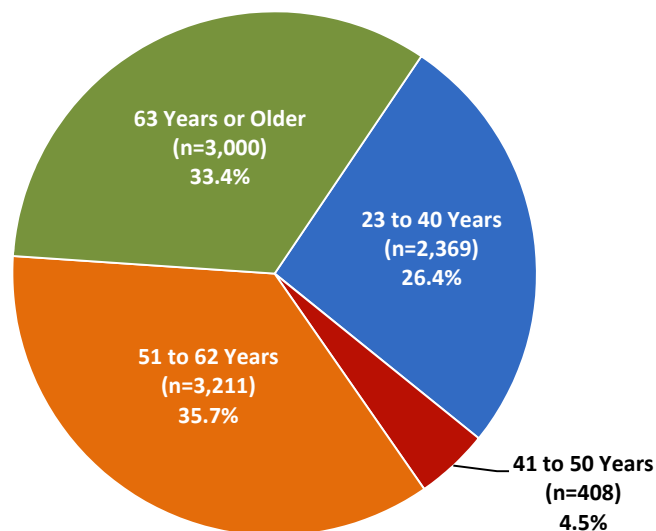

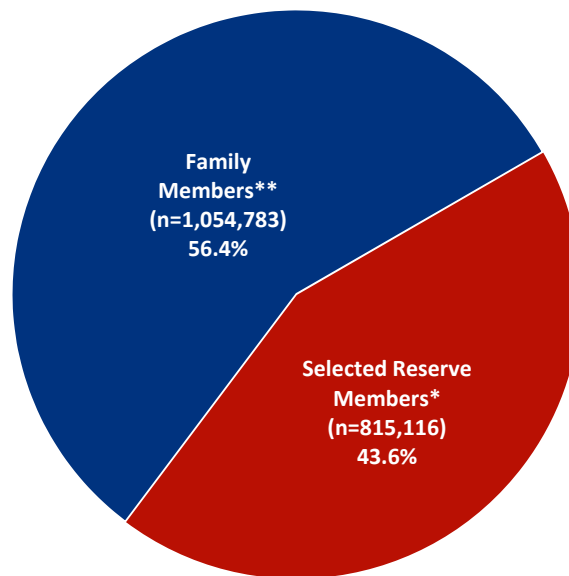

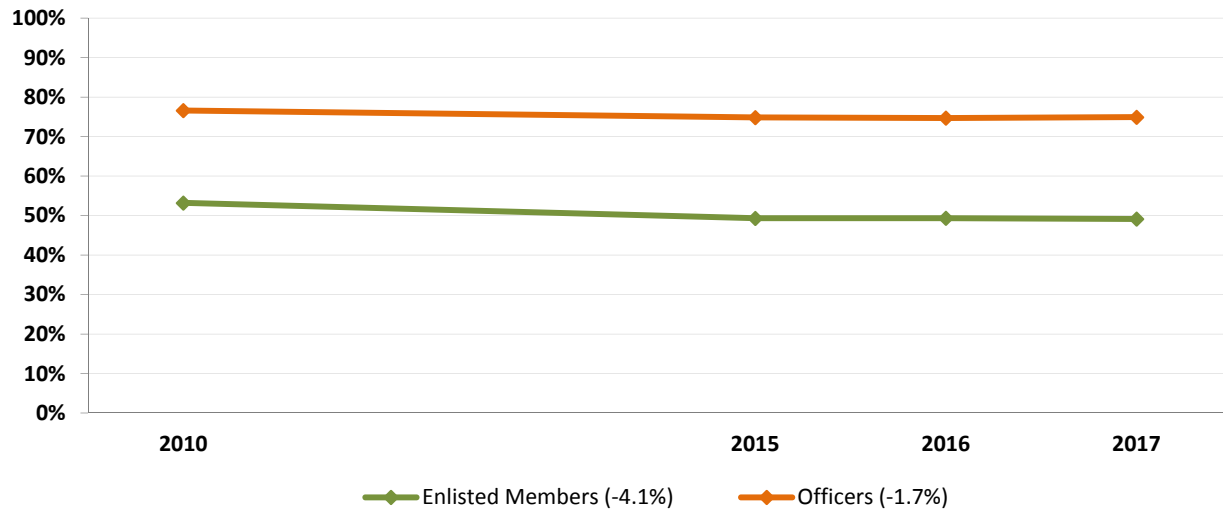

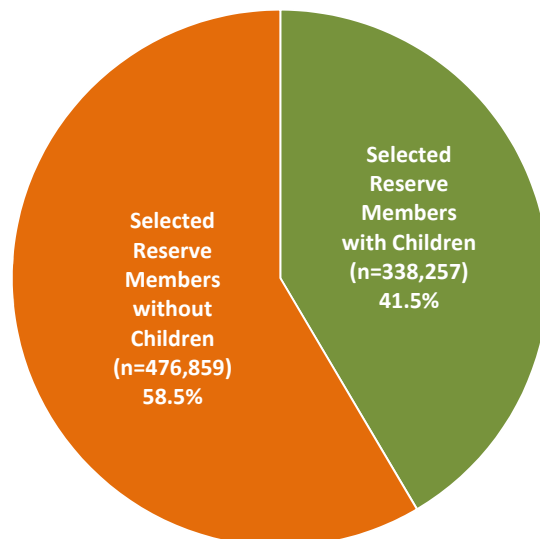

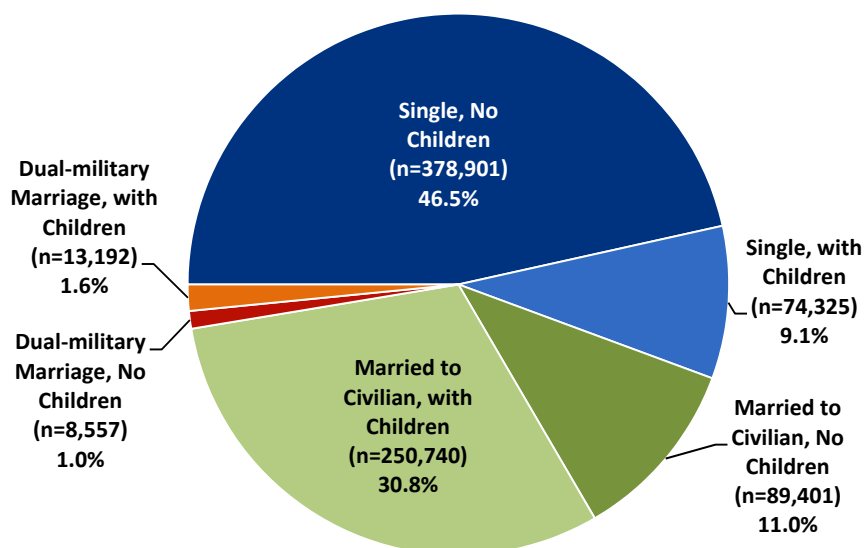

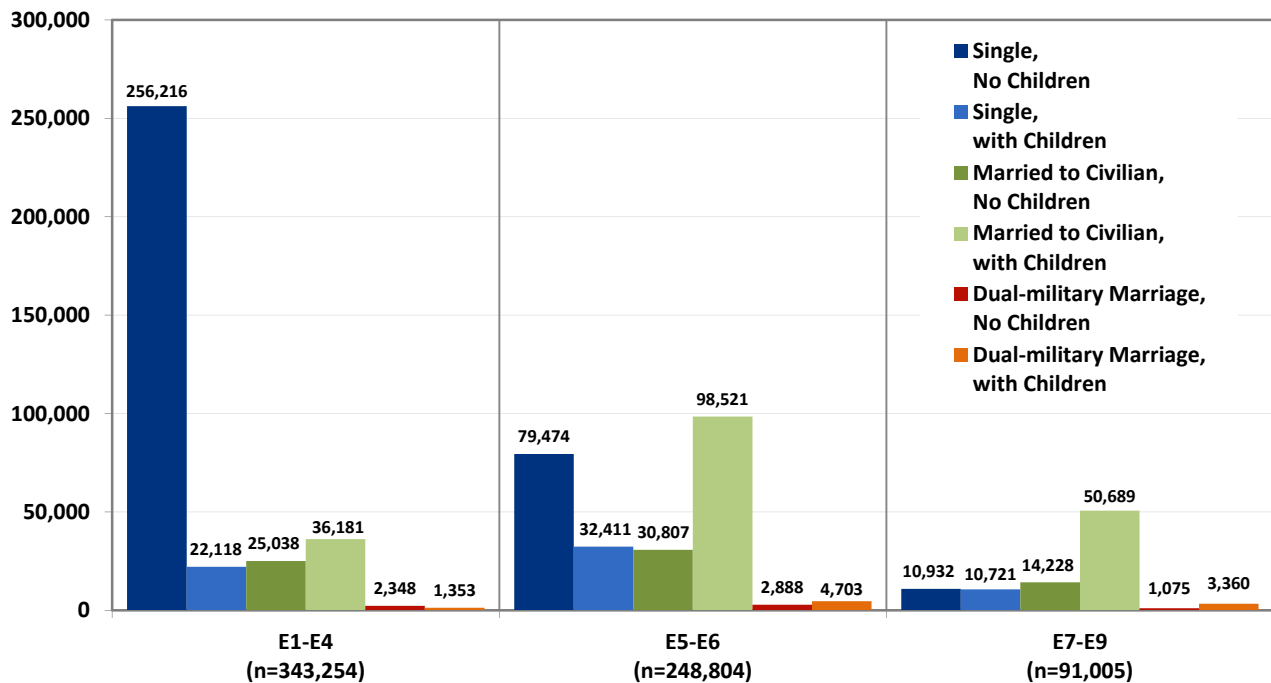

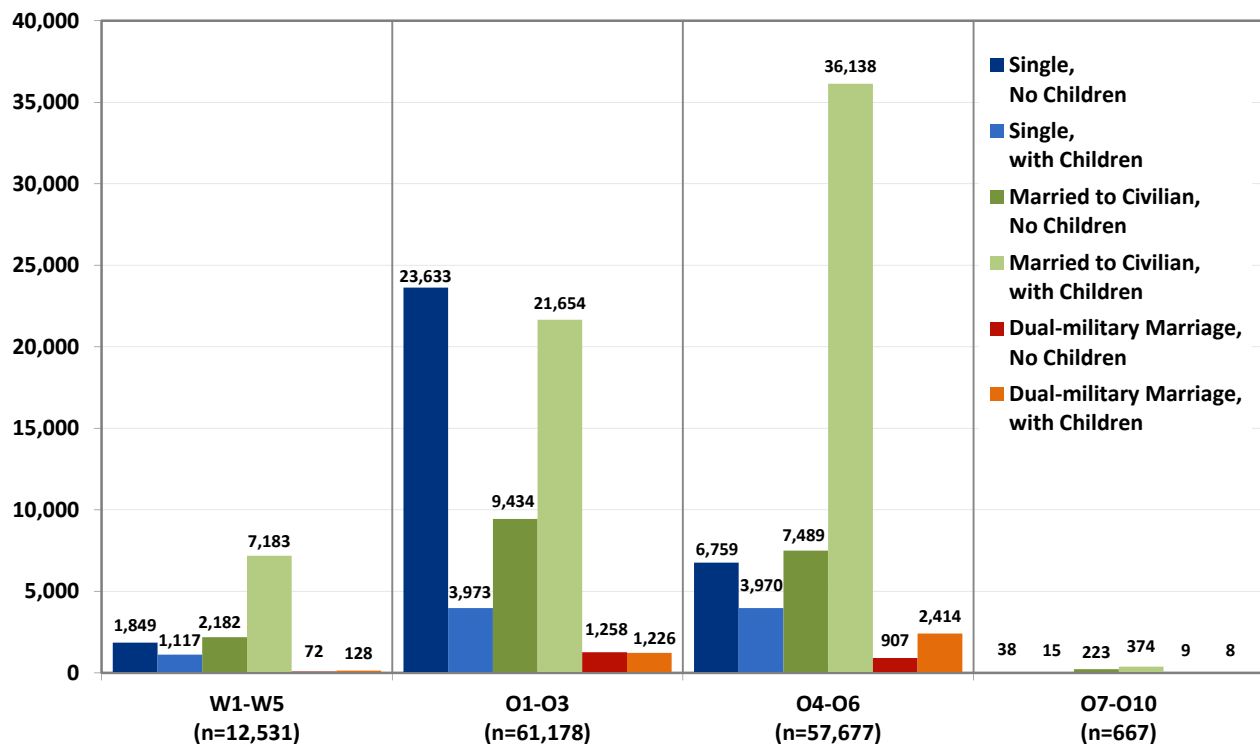

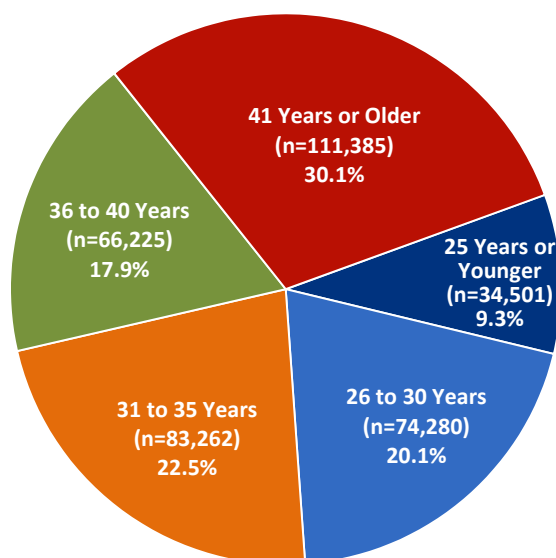

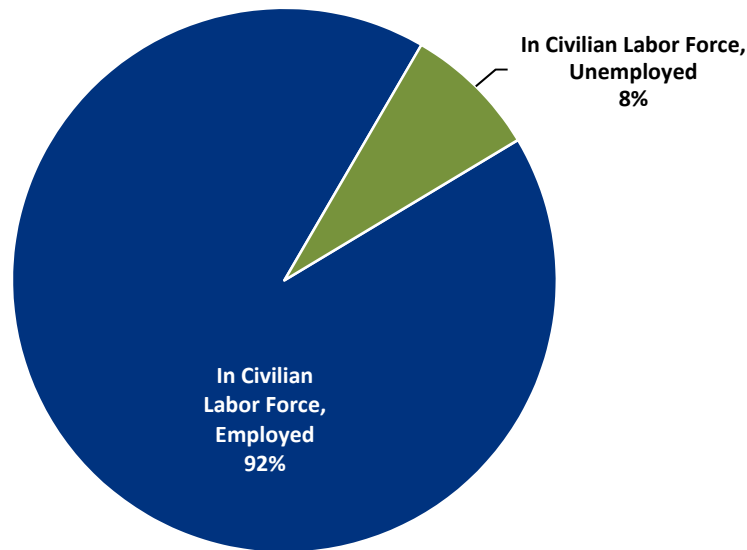

## 6.18 ■ Employment Status of Selected Reserve Civilian Spouses in Civilian Labor Force

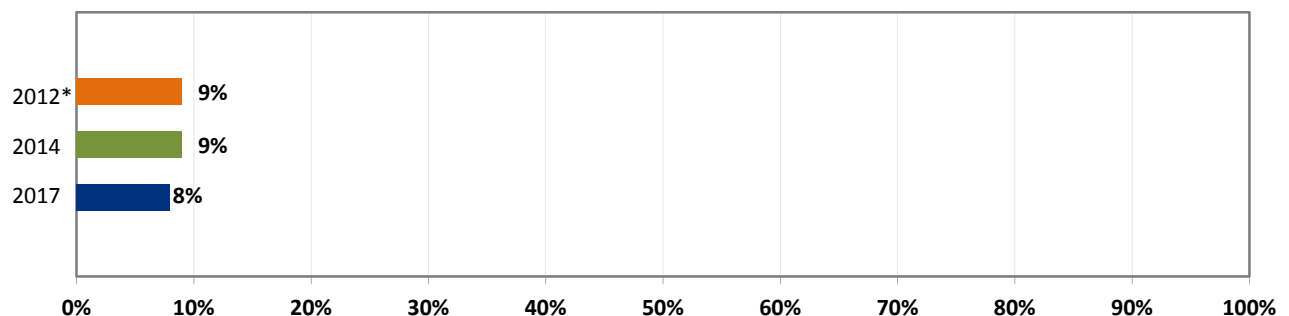

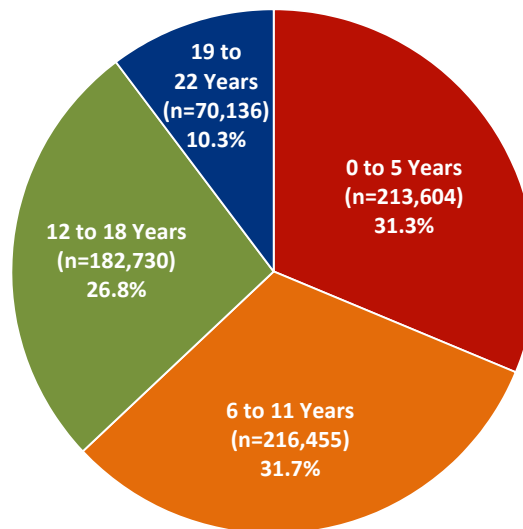

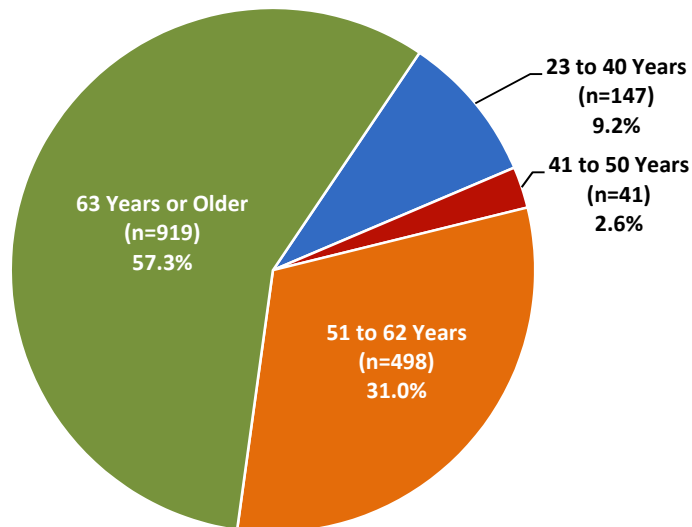
